FRANKS OF LIGHTNING.

Several Houses Near Florence Struck During Recent Storm.
The Florence Post says: "Several sharp peals of thunder awoke the people of Florence from their slumbers early Tuesday morning. The lightning struck the roof of John Saffley's house in Glenada, splintering the shingles over a space about six feet long and three feet wide over an electric light. The electricity then evidently followed the lighting wires away from the building. The lightning struck the ground between John Saffley's residence and that of Mrs. Barrett, tearing up a large hole in the earth. Some window glass was broken in the residence of Frank Fox in Glenada and that of Wm. Saffley in Florence.

PLANS NOT KNOWN.

Goethals Stated for Governor of Panama, Or To Build Road.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 24.—If Col. Goethals intends to resign from the army to become justice commissioner of New York his plans are unknown at the War Department. It is generally understood that the President intends to make Goethals the first Governor of the Canal Zone.
"It seems incredible," said Secretary Garrison at the suggestion that Col. Goethals might resign.
"We want him to build the new government railroad in Alaska," said Secretary Lane of the interior department.
No intimation of the Colonel's plans has reached the Isthmian Canal Commission's office.

MORE NAMES ARE REQUIRED

VOTERS WISHING GOOD ROADS HAVE SHORT TIME LEFT IN WHICH TO ENCOURAGE PLAN BY SIGNING PETITION.

During the last two weeks names have been coming in slowly on the petitions asking the county to call a special election for the issuance of bonds for good roads and for the disposition of the funds. While there was the greatest enthusiasm shown at the good roads meeting here over a month ago, there does not appear to be any rush on the part of voters to register for the year 1914 and to sign the petitions.

President A. T. Morrison, of the Coos County Good Roads Association, of Coquille, has written to Justice Penneck urging efforts to arouse more interest among the voters of Marshfield. The registering places are at the Chamber of Commerce and at the view of the fact that automobiles owned in Marshfield and North Bend, also vehicles of any other description, cannot get beyond the confines of either town because of the bad condition of the roads, it is believed that more interest should be taken or else the plans for good roads may fall through.

The following is the letter written by President Morrison: "Judge Penneck, Marshfield, Oregon: Dear Sir—Would it be possible to get the Marshfield voters to get in and register and sign up the road bond petitions any faster? I am anxious that we have a large petition from Marshfield for the reason that we have not had any large number of signers heretofore from there. I know that the people there must be as much interested as we are over here in the success of our road proposition.

"I will write to some of the boys over there to get in and do a little hustling and ask the people to register and sign up. Please send the petitions to me on the last Saturday in this month. Also send your registration to the County Clerk so he will be able to check up the names on the petition. If these are not turned in the clerk will not be able to examine and check up the petitions and report to the court so that they will be able to take action on the same.

"We do not want to fall down on the matter from any cause. Thanking you for the interest you are taking in the matter I beg to remain, very truly, A. T. Morrison."

MRS. WILSON IN CONTEST CASE.

Wife of President One of Parties in Landoffice Case.

King is said to have acquired the tract with land scrip, but did not perfect his title. He sold to Mrs. Axson Elliott, sister of Mrs. Wilson, for \$1500, according to the records, and Mrs. Elliott sold it to Mrs. Wilson for \$3000. It is said. In the meantime Mrs. Maud Hensle of Los Angeles filed on the land as a homestead and later passed her rights to it on to Homer Goddard, athletic instructor in the Los Angeles high school.
