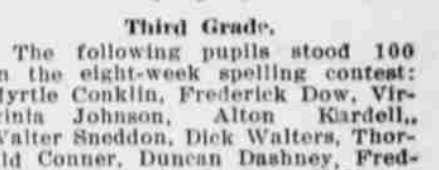
Third Grade.
