Great Singer Holds Large Audience Spellbound With Wonderful Voice

Mme. Marta Sandal, the great cantatrice, gave a fascinating program at her concert in the Finnish Hall last evening, when over 200 people enjoyed her songs, rendered in Norwegian, German and English. Singing of such excellence as hers is seldom heard in this city and her varied program held the audience spellbound until the close of each number, when she was vigorously applauded.

Her voice is wonderfully sweet, being a mezzo soprano of beautiful quality, and the sincerity and simplicity with which she stamps her solos are added attractions. Perhaps her greatest charm lies in her ignorance of the impression she creates and the unassuming way in which she speaks and sings.
