"A Life on the Ocean Wave"

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 20.—There is an old song that goes something like this:

"Sailing, sailing
Over the bounding main;
Many a stormy wind shall blow
Ere Jack comes home again."
Just substitute Frances, Nora, Besse, Alice, Tom, Dick or Harry for Jack and you will have the situation of the Redondo passengers on the last trip. There were many "stormy winds"—and other forms of meteorological expression. In fact we encountered the entire 57 varieties of weather—sun and storm, wave and wind, rain and hail, calm and clear—we had 'em all.

Some Seasickness.

Seasick, did you say? Well, some. Of all the gay and giddy throng that crowded the tables in the Redondo dining saloon three times Thursday noon, only two lonely passengers responded to the evening call to the banquet board. If you have ever been seasick you will understand. If you have not it would be futile to attempt to tell you. Seasickness is something that is indescribable. It comes on you suddenly and leaves you lingeringly. When you are in the full grip of the monster it dominates you to the exclusion of every other human emotion. Ambition, fame, fortune, power, pride, love, friendship, all are but idle and meaningless words, empty forms of material things that may interest others, but they have no appeal or lure for you. It makes a misanthrope of a merry man and a proud man becomes a pitiful object of abjection. It is the one known affliction that neither commands nor desires sympathy. All that the seasick one wants is to be left alone in misery. Words of sympathy or advice irritate instead of comfort. Someone says the ship may sink. The seasick one knows it will. In other afflictions the victim clings to the desire to live; when thoroughly seasick one only desires to die. Let the end come and come quickly. "Oh grave, where is thy sting. Oh! death, where is thy victory?"

Some Wireless Messages.

During a brief lull in the storm Baptist Publication Society, was one of the best that has been given here in a long time. A short program preceded an address by Dr. Lamson, Rev. A. F. Bassford presiding.

Dr. Lamson's remarks were centered around the work of the society, and some interesting facts were given. He spoke of the work which the society is doing all over the country, through the aid of the chapel cars, which operate in the Middle West, and the collector wagons which go in districts that are shut off from the railroads, and the automobiles which are at work in California, and later of the work which the collector boats are doing in sections where there are neither railroads nor roads. Dr. Lamson was enthusiastic in his praises for the people of Marshfield and Coos County, who made possible the building of the cruiser "Life-Line," captain G. L. Hall in charge. The idea of a gospel boat first originated here, and the Life-Line was the first boat to be used for that purpose in this country. He said the people deserve a great deal of credit for the sacrifice which was necessary for the completion of the boat. There is one other gospel boat, the "Oceola," operating in the country known as the Netherlands, and which has been along the Sacramento River. These boats are ministering to thousands of people who have never had the privilege of having the gospel preached, and for the first time are listening to his message.

Another boat is now under construction, the "Robert G. Seymour," which will soon be launched and will be used in the Puget Sound country.

The American Baptist Publication Society is the largest enterprise of the kind in the world, and is the only one that is entirely self supporting. Dr. Lamson said that for every dollar raised last year by the churches throughout the country for missionary purposes, the society was able to add eleven cents from its own income, making the dollar worth one dollar and eleven cents. Dr. Lamson has full charge of all the missionary activities of the society, which are carried by through the chapel cars, wagons, automobiles and boats. He is a bright and entertaining speaker and has a pleasing personality and made many witty remarks which the appreciative audience greeted with loud applause. He said he thoroughly enjoyed his trip over the Rosburg stage line. Despite the inclement weather and the fact that he left this morning via Dr. A. for Portland and Seattle, where he has appointments to speak, and from there will return to Philadelphia. The doctor expects to make another trip in the near future, possibly next May.
