**Receives Boat**—Fred Larson yesterday recovered the second of his launches that was wrecked from its moorings by the storm Sunday. It was about four miles up Kentuck Inlet, where the wind and tide had carried it, and was not damaged.

**Receives Badge**—Through a little Times found ad, V. C. Gorst yesterday recovered his 1914 official chauffeur badge. The badge was picked up by Bill Smith, who brought it to The Times, and a single insertion of the ad found the owner.

**Drink Too Much**—Jan Bowman, arrested yesterday for appearing on the streets in a drunken condition, and O. N. Carpenter, arrested on the charge of drunkenness and vagrancy, were fined \$5 on the drink no water charge this morning by Recorder Butler.

**Contractors Leave**—S. Benson, Thomas Dixon, E. V. Hauser, and J. E. Nelson, the railroad contractors who have been in the city for several days, left yesterday by way of Gardiner for Eugene. They will go over the route of the Willamette Pacific and inspect conditions following the heavy rains and storms.

**Work Progressing**—The remodeling and enlarging of the Eastside mill is progressing in good shape and they are hopeful of having it completed and ready for operations early in March. The new boilers, which will furnish 1700 horsepower for it, arrived on the last Redondo and are ready to be installed.

**Bandon Store Sold**—According to a report reaching here today the large mercantile business of R. H. Rosa & Company at Bandon has been purchased by Mr. Dickey, a recent arrival from New York. The Rosa company has been conducted by Sandy Thrift and Harry Pierce and is one of the largest mercantile establishments in the county.

**Favor Simpson**—Paul Dimmick, the North Bend lumberman, was here today on business. He said that he had just received word from a San Francisco friend who said that he would contribute \$300 towards the campaign fund of L. J. Simpson if the latter would be a candidate for Congress.

**Not Decided**—L. J. Simpson, of North Bend, was in Marshfield today. He has not fully decided whether or not he will be a candidate for Congress this year, although many are urging him to do so. Capt. Magenn promised him the support of the Progressives.

**To Take Degree**—H. L. Coleman, son-in-law of A. J. Savage, will be initiated at a meeting of Blanco Lodge this evening. Mr. Coleman is rapidly recovering from his recent injuries and will leave on the next Redondo for California, where he will spend a month or so. Mrs. Coleman and son will remain in Marshfield.

**Home Is Burned**—During the storm fast Sunday night, the residence of J. C. Shields, of Bandon, was burned to the ground. There was \$1800 insurance on the structure and the loss sustained was \$2,500. Ivy growing alongside the chimney was blown over the sparks from the latter by the wind, starting the blaze on the roof.

**Typewriter Agency**—C. R. Stockin, who has been making this territory for the Underwood typewriter for the last few years, has decided to locate on the Bay and is arranging to open a typewriter supply house here.

He has ordered his stock and expects to open an office within ten days, handling new and second hand machines and all kinds of supplies.

**Students at Leisure**—Owing to a mishap in the heating system at the North Bend High School studies have been dispensed with until such time as repairs are made. This will afford the members of the classes taking examinations an opportunity to brush up. Delays are dangerous, but this is one that came at the right moment.

**Home Damaged**—Harry G. Butler, now engineer on the Smith-Powers road beyond Myrtle Point, and his wife, had a narrow escape in the storm Sunday. They became alarmed at the violence of the wind and went outside their tent house to see what was happening. While they were out a big tree fell across the tent-house, crushing it and all its contents to the ground.

**Nearly Seventy**—Col. R. H. Rosa of Bandon, who returned home today after a pleasant visit with his many friends on the Bay, stated yesterday that he was nearly seventy years old and was growing younger instead of older, because he felt better than he had in years. That he will continue to grow young is the ardent wish of his many friends on the Bay, both young and old.

**Basketball Game**—The Myrtle Point basketball team arrived on the noon train today. They are scheduled to meet the North Bend team this evening and an interesting game is promised. The members of the Myrtle Point team are Harry Dement, Dave Rackleff, Roy Spires, Allie Bartlett, Paul Brewer, Harry Miller, Leonard Rackleff and Allison Roberts. They are in charge of Manager A. T. Sparks.

**Another Rescuer**—M. H. Mulloy stated today that one of his drivers was the man who rescued the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. P. Burrows from the mud fill in South Marshfield the other day. The driver was reticent about the feat and did not want his name used. It might have been that the latter rescued another child or there is some sort of a mixup, as Harry Welch and Leslie Blanchard are credited with having saved the Burrows child.

**Banker Returns**—Among the celebrities arriving on the good ship Breakwater today was Herbert Buserud, returning from an extended trip east, including a visit to his home at Crookston, Minnesota. "It's nice to go East," said Mr. Buserud, today, "but it's nicer to return west. I did not know what a warm spot Coos Bay held in my bosom until after my leaving, which was in September of last year. The outside world generally is deeply interested in Coos Bay and I have been receiving inquiries from all sides as to the prospects here."

**Blowing Up Tug**—Pieces of the old sunken tug Escort passed through the air at great speed this morning in the direction of the sun when a force of men elevated several portions of her from the mud flats by the use of dynamite. Hundreds of sticks of the explosive were planted beneath the old wreck, but she was built in an era when boats were put together to stay, and while she was loosened up considerably and twisted around in her grave, she was still strongly enough bedded to defy the dredge unless more dynamite is used at too next low tide.

**Damages Water Main**—While driving piling on the Noble lot on Fourth street, near Central, yesterday afternoon, Charles Noble sank a piling through the Coos Bay Water Company's big main which supplies most of South Marshfield. The main was on the property line. Mr. Noble had been driving piling for the Mill Slough drain box but swung over to work on the lot when the tide would permit him to work on the latter and the accident occurred while he was doing the private work.
