Coen says that Lee represented to him that McArthur Brothers of New York had contracted to build a railroad known as the Oregon Eastern & Bandon Railway.
"On the strength of this contract Lee was to receive \$13,750. On this representation Coen advanced Lee \$500, and the railroad has not yet been built."

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31.—Special rules to expedite the Burnett immigration bill fixing a literary test, and the Shakleford bill for \$25,000,000 Federal aid to state road construction, were reported today by the House rules committee.

LIBRARY NOTES.

The Springfield, Mass., Public Library thought recently it would like to find out what were actually the most popular books in the library, so it had its patrons vote for the book each had liked best. "Joseph Vance," an English novel by De Morgan, headed the list. This book is written very much in the style of Dicken's books and can not be finished at a single sitting. It is said of it that when the girls who made typewritten copies of it were working on it, the story moved them, hardened as they were to copying fiction, to tears.
The book that received the next largest number of votes was Antin's "Promised Land," an account by an emigrant girl of her education by the great educators of this country, the public school and the public library. Her entrance into the school room was to her and to her people what the sacrament is to many.
After this book came Kipling's "Collected Verse" and his "Kim." Then Morley's "Life of Gladstone"; Jane Addams' "Twenty Years at Hull House"; James' "Varieties of Religious Experience"; Booker T. Washington's "Up From Slavery"; Barry's "Margaret Ogilvy," who, it is well known is Barrie's mother and also she is the mother of the "Little Minister" in the book of that name.
Then came Matier's "Life of the Bee"; Wilson's "History of the American People"; Berenson's "Creative Evolution"; Grahame's "Golden Age," a story of children for grown-up people; Noye's "Poems"; Stedman's "American Anthology"; and Payne's "Mark Twain." In regard to this last book, which the library had to return to the State library, many readers will be glad to know that we have this book again so they can read it.
The other books were "Japan, An Attempt at Interpretation," written by Hearn, whose mother was a Greek, whose father was an Irishman and who married a Japanese, is one of the most sympathetic accounts of any country ever written; Rolland's "Jean Christophe," a novel; Stedman's "Victorian Anthology"; Thayer's "Life and Times of Cavour" and Andrew D. White's "Autobiography."
The books enumerated above are all in the public library. None of them are pay books, so all can be kept for two weeks and renewed.
