ALLIANCE WILL TAKE OUT PULP

First Big Shipment Being Taken on the Portland Boat Sunday Afternoon

Held back several hours by a stiff nor'wester which blew all day yesterday, the steamer Alliance, Captain Gus Lofstedt, arrived in the harbor from Eureka today at 11 o'clock and berthed at Marshfield shortly after 12 o'clock. She will take on over 100 tons of pulp from the local mill and a big shipment of cedar today, which will prevent her sailing today and she will depart tomorrow at 1 o'clock in the afternoon for Portland.

Captain Lofstedt reported that the recent hurricane was severe at the California port, but no great damage was done. The bar was quite smooth when he came in this morning, and he passed the lighthouse tender Manzanita, which is going over the range lights at the entrance to the bay. The Manzanita arrived from Portland a day or so ago to place lights of extra power in the place of the range lights, which cannot be kept burning during high winds.

The pulp being taken out by the Alliance is the first shipment of any size sent from here since the new mill commenced operations. It is consigned to Lebanon, Oregon, and a couple of other points where it will be made into sample paper for the Portland Chamber of Commerce and other organizations which will boost the manufacture of the pulp in Oregon.
