**FOOD IMPORTS ARE GROWING**

**IMPORTATIONS OF FRESH BEEF AND BEEF CATTLE FAR EXCEED LAST YEAR'S.—EXPORTS DECREASING.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 4.—Food importation in November showed a marked increase over the corresponding month of the preceding year and a material increase over the figures for October. This is especially apparent in fresh beef and beef cattle. Importation of fresh beef, which amounted to 5,666,666 pounds in October, were practically double the quantity in November, the figures for November being 10,856,516 pounds, valued at \$900,296. Of pork the importations during November were 110,000 pounds and of mutton 32,000 pounds. More than one-half of the beef imports came direct from England; 3,250,000 pounds having been received at New York and 2,250,000 pounds at Boston, while Canada sent 2,666,666 pounds to Chicago, a half million pounds to New York and a quarter of a million pounds to Boston. At the Pacific Coast ports the imports were 580,000 pounds, chiefly from Australia.

**England's Beef Imported**

As to the origin of the practically 6,000,000 pounds of fresh beef imported from England, the records supplied to the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce make no specific statement, though the fact that there were practically no arrivals of fresh beef direct from Argentina suggests that at least a portion of the beef coming from England may have originated in Argentina, which country is now England's chief source of supply of foreign-grown beef.

**Imports on Increase.**

Cattle importations in November also show a very large increase over those of the corresponding month of 1912, having been 123,118 head, valued at \$3,306,723, against 43,758 head, valued at \$829,358, in November, 1912. The total number of cattle imported in October and November, under the operations of the new tariff law, was 253,757 head, valued at \$6,704,790. The value of cattle imports in October and November was greater than that of all the earlier months of the year, while the quantity of beef imported was also much in excess of that of the earlier months of the year. The value of cattle imports for the full calendar year will approximate \$15,000,000, while the exports of cattle will amount to less than \$1,000,000 value, against \$3,500,000 in 1912, \$14,000,000 in 1911, \$24,000,000 in 1908 and \$41,000,000 in 1905.

**Wheat Importations**

The importations of wheat during the month of November were 127,000 bushels, against 2000 bushels in November, 1912; and of flour, 10,824 barrels, against 6,190 barrels in the same month of 1912. Importations of oats in November were 5,132,208 bushels, against 4,266 bushels in November of the preceding year. The importations of potatoes during November were 764,863 bushels, against 10,668 bushels in November, 1912.

**THE CAPTAIN SWEEP AWAY**

**Aberdeen Mariner Lost With Schooner's Deckload.**

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 4.—Its captain swept overboard in one of a series of gales that all but wrecked it, the four-masted schooner Edward R. West made port, 33 days from Eureka. Leaking, the vessel was taken in tow by a tug off the Golden Gate.

Captain Stream's faithful Great Dane dog was at its master's heels and the same wave which carried the well-known skipper to his death swept his dog overboard.

In addition to the lost captain, Captain Thomas F. Stream, of Aberdeen, Wash., the West carried 12 men and officers and M. W. Strong, a San Francisco author, who was making the trip from Eureka to Peru to get local color.

"I got enough," was Strong's summary of the trip.

The West, brought in under First Officer Roschld, was five days off Eureka for Peru and 150 miles off Eureka when the gale struck. Stream was carried overboard with part of the deckload of lumber of 300,000 feet. William Fricke, seaman, was injured by the same wave. Four seamen were imprisoned and nearly drowned when waves broke into the donkey house. They were saved when another wave broke through the other side, giving them egress. Seamen also were nearly drowned in the flooded forecabin. The crew worked the pumps night and day for four days. Captain Stream leaves a widow and son at Aberdeen.

**LAND CASE TO BE FOUGHT.** Attorney Says Henry Hewitt, Jr., Will Appeal to High Court. PORTLAND, Or., Feb. 4.—"The Hewitt land case will be taken to the Circuit Court of Appeals at San Francisco, and if necessary to the United States Supreme Court," said Robert G. Smith, of Grants Pass, attorney for Henry Hewitt, Jr., of Seattle.

A recent decision in the United States District Court at Portland declared the patents to the Hewitt timber lands, comprising 26 claims in eastern Oregon, near Sumpter, forfeited to the Government, as having been obtained irregularly. It was charged by the Government that Hewitt supplied money which was paid to people to locate on the claims, and then again supplied money to buy the relinquishments.

The lands are estimated by Government attorneys to be worth \$75,000.

The Coquille Sentinel says: The formal opening of the library in the new city hall here last Saturday afternoon and evening was an event of greater significance and importance than many which are more widely heralded and acclaimed with much greater demonstrations. For it marks a distinct step in the educational and literary life of this city and the surrounding country—a milestone in the pathway of progress towards the things that are highest and best and most worth while in the community.

The reception committee, consisting of Mrs. E. Belloni, Mrs. C. R. Barrow, Mrs. Emma Lyons, Mrs. J. S. Lawrence, Mrs. W. J. Longston and Mrs. A. J. Robertson, made the visitors at home, and furnished, in addition to the refreshments provided, all desired information. The history the ladies gave of their efforts and struggles, their successes and failures, in the years past, in trying to build up and maintain a library here, including the purchase of two business lots for a library building, was of special interest to the writer, who had been familiar with similar unselfish work for the public welfare in other cities like this.

The bequest made last year of the private library of the late Hon. E. G. D. Holden comprises between 400 and 500 books, and forms the major part of the collection. This is contained in a set of shelves at the northwest corner of the room; while the 250 books of the old library do not go very far towards filling the capacious racks.
