**Ferry Traffic.**—Capt. Alex Hall, of the ferry Transit, reports that during January he carried 42 head of stock, 84 autos, 292 single rigs, 92 teams and 5294 passengers.

**Two Arrests.**—Walter Herman and Frank Bacon were the only two arrests made by the police last night, Officer Stutsman getting both of the offenders, who were charged with intoxication.

**Settles Case.**—The case of L. E. Blivens of the Marshfield Turkeys' Baths against Addison Cook and wife to collect money for baths, has been settled out of court and the proceedings will be dropped. Mrs. Cook paid the bill.

**Dissolve Firm.**—D. J. Rees retired today from the firm of Rees & Sneddon, who conduct the Eagle saloon, his partner, Hugh Sneddon, purchasing his interest. Mr. Rees will devote his time to developing his coal properties and looking after his real estate interests.

**Remove Quarantine.**—G. K. Gee, head of the construction department of the Coos Bay Home Telephone company, was released from quarantine today. He has fully recovered from the attack of smallpox. His was the only case of smallpox in Marshfield in a long time.

**Had Good Year.**—Secretary R. T. Kaufman, of the Millhomea Club, says that the past year has been one of the best in the history of the club. It is now in excellent financial condition and during the year added materially to its membership. The members and officers of the club are gratified over its successful year.

**Infant Dies.**—The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed McKeown died at Mercy Hospital this morning. Their many friends will unite in extending sympathy to them in the loss of their first born. Mr. McKeown is foreman of the Smith-Powers camp at Coaledo. Mrs. McKeown is doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances.

**Swear to Bills.**—Under a new order of the county court, all officers and others having bills against the county must make them out in detail on special blanks and swear to them. Constable Cox is today sending in his first bills for services. In cases where the bill is small, the notary charge of \$1 will eat a big hole in the profits on the deal.

**Mail Delay.**—According to Captain L. G. Masters of the Sunrise, the Coos Bay mail will arrive later from now on owing to the low tides which will prevent the mail boat from leaving Sumner. Captain Masters suggests that it would be a good plan for the Port Commission to allow the dredge to get busy near Sumner and prevent the delay which is certain to arise from this time on.

**New Court Reporter.**—A. D. Loud, formerly of Mapleton and Eugene, and at one time reporter of the U. S. Federal Court in Minnesota, has wired Judge Coke his acceptance of the appointment as reporter in Judge Coke's court. He is now in San Francisco and will arrive here within a few days. His arrival will enable Judge Coke to try a number of cases that have been hanging fire.

**Rogers Is Sought.**—Constable Cox and Justice Pennock are seeking Alfred Rogers, who is wanted for failure to support his wife. # LANE IS LACONIC.

The following from a New York paper will be of interest on Coos Bay, as Senator Harry Lane spent his earlier years in Marshfield with his father, who promoted the company that built the old steamer Messenger, whose hulk is perceptible at low tide on the mudflats east of the Alliance warehouse:  
 "Not for the multitude, but for the fewness of his words, is Senator Lane, of Oregon, likely to become famous. Asked to contribute a sketch of himself to the Congressional Directory, Mr. Lane wrote: 'Harry Lane, Democrat of Oregon, term expires March 3, 1918.' Now if he had been like the member of Congress from a certain district of the state, he might have perpetuated the names of all the other members of his family in that record, even down to the nephews.  
 "When asked how he liked his Senate job he responded: 'I feel perfectly at home here, as I was once superintendent of the Oregon asylum for the insane before I came here.'"
