Opens About Feb. 15

MANY TO FLY AROUND WORLD

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 5.—Three hundred thousand dollars and perhaps more will be offered in prizes to aeronauts who race around the world in any type of motor-driven air craft under the auspices of the Panama Pacific International Exposition Company, and subscription arrangements on foot for securing the remainder are said to indicate an even larger sum than \$300,000.

It is said to be the largest prize fund ever offered for a single sporting event.

The race, the climax of the world's aeronautical activities thus far, is to start early in May, 1915.

Contestants will have 90 days in which to make the flight of approximately 22,000 miles around the globe. The race is to start and finish on the grounds of the Panama Pacific Exposition and the course lies east from San Francisco.

The route as now outlined crosses the Atlantic Ocean, England, France, Germany, Russia, Japan and the Pacific Ocean, touching the world's largest capitals, the Arctic, the subtropics of the Orient, and the Siberian wastes. Specifically the line runs from San Francisco through Reno, Nevada, Cheyenne, Wyo.; from there either to Kansas City, St. Louis or Chicago, on to New York.

Atlantic Most Difficult Stretch

The Atlantic Ocean is conceded to be the most formidable stretch in the race. It will be essayed from Belle Isle, a small point between Newfoundland and Labrador, Cape Farewell, Greenland, the next stop, barring a drop into the water, is 610 miles away, and from Cape Farewell to Reyjavik, Iceland, is 670 miles further. One more jump to Stornaway, in the Hebrides, is 570 miles, and the Atlantic has been crossed.

The Aleutian Islands will mark the crossing of the Pacific.

A NEW LIFE PRESERVER.

Jacket Made of "Kapok" Given a Typically French Trial in Paris.

Paris Letter to London Telegraph. It seems that life-buoys, cork jackets and all such cumbersome life saving apparatus are now superseded by the life saving jackets of M. Deruder, which are lined with a little known substance called "kapok," a sort of very fine cotton wood which surrounds the seeds of certain trees.

Recently, in the presence of representatives of the ministry of marine, the prefecture of the French Maritime League, and the Central Life Saving Society, three men clad in kapok-lined jackets and waistcoats flung themselves haphazard into the Seine, near the Pont Alexander. A second afterward they bobbed up cheerfully and very much at their ease. One of them even drew a bottle and a glass from his pocket and drank to the health of the inventor in unwatered cognac. Soon afterward they were joined in the water by a young lady, Mile. Renee Barderes, in an elegantly cut deruderized garment.

DOPE HABIT IN EAST.

BOSTON, Feb. 5.—J. Frank Chase, secretary of the Watch and Ward society, declares that the exclusive districts of the Back Bay are suffering from the "dope" habit, as well as the poorer quarters. The cases of two druggists and two clerks were heard yesterday. The men were charged with unlawfully delivering cocaine and heroin. Mr. Chase considers these drugs one of the greatest curses of modern civilization. "It is allied with the white slave traffic and is utilized very generally to the advantage of the white slaver," he said.

MAY DIVIDE LANE COUNTY

Movement at Florence Takes Definite Form.

The movement to create a new county out of the western end of Lane County seems to have taken definite form. The Shuslaw Pilot in its last issue says:

"There is considerable interest now being taken in a move to have the western part of Lane County made into a new county. This would have to be accomplished under Senate bill No. 151, introduced at the 1911 Legislative assembly by Senator Wood, and vetoed February 24, 1911, by Governor West, and passed over his veto at the 1913 session.

It will take a petition to the county court signed by a majority of the voters of the proposed new county, to have the question placed on the ballot at the regular election next November, at which time there must be a vote cast showing 65 per cent in the territory proposed to be made a new county, and 35 per cent in the balance of the old county, favorable for the question to carry.

From Mapleton, Glenada, Acme and all parts of Western Lane County come requests that this matter be brought to an issue and a mass meeting be held soon."

FOR AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION.

DULUTH, Minn., Feb. 5.—Under the auspices of the agricultural extension division of the university, an original meeting for agricultural interests is being held here in aid of rural school workers. Government experts from Washington and from the remotest parts of the country will be concerned in the efforts for agricultural education and developments, as planned. Two representatives of the department of farm management of the Agricultural Department, Washington, and a government expert who has charge of field work and land clearing, will deliver lectures.

SWEDEN AGAINST COLD STORAGE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 5.—Sweden and Norway have protested, through the state department, to the cold storage bill on which the House Commerce Committee began hearings yesterday. The Swedish legation pointed out that Sweden exports both salt and preserved fish on a large scale and protests against the proposal to limit storage to two months.

TO CONVERT MOSLEMS.

TOLEDO, Ohio, Feb. 5.—The World's Sunday School Association touring parties met in this city today. They are traveling in the interests of Christianizing the Moslems. The Ohio Sunday School Association has called upon all of its field workers and county superintendents to attend the meeting. The needs of the Moslem world will be concisely set forth by distinguished men in the party, among whom are Marion Lawrence, the world's greatest Sunday school authority; the Rev. S. M. Jewner and Rev. S. R. Van Trowbridge.

\$1,000,000 FAILURE PAYS OUT.

MACON, Ga., Feb. 5.—A hearing was given here yesterday for any creditors objecting to the sale of the unpledged assets of the Yaryan Naval Stores company, of Brunswick. The creditors' committee contends that the property, which includes plants at Gulfport, Miss., and Brunswick, and manufactured stock valued at \$300,000, can be sold for \$900,000. They declare this amount will be sufficient to pay all claims against the company.

ROADS INVESTIGATED BY STATE.

KENOSHA, Wis., Feb. 5.—The state commissioners, in a state-wide campaign of investigation, granted hearings against former legislator Michael G. McGeehan. The latter is County Highway Commissioner and recent inquiries into complaints revealed facts in connection with road work in the county which are the subject of the investigation by the State Commission.

THE ROYALTY TABOOS TANGO

LONDON, Feb. 5.—Arrangements have been completed for an informal dance at Buckingham Palace this month. The king and queen are fond of dancing, as are almost all the younger members of the royal family. Princess Mary, a skilful dancer, will be allowed to be present, although she is not to make her appearance at any court function until she is sixteen. The tango will be tabooed.
