MUSICAL.

On Tuesday evening Dr. and Mrs. Wm. Horsfall gave a musicale in honor of Mr. Wolfram Schmedding, who is to leave Marshfield soon. Several musicians of note had offered their services for the evening, and the invited guests knew that an exceptionally pleasurable evening awaited them. About seventy-five music enthusiasts had accepted the invitations and when, shortly after 8 o'clock, the programme commenced, the tastefully decorated residence had the appearance of a small concert salon.

The introduction of the evening was the flute solo, "Rhapsodie Americaine." Mr. Schmedding played like we are used to hearing him play. He overcame the particularly difficult passages, cadences and variations of this composition with brilliant technique and again proved himself, throughout the evening, master of his instrument.

Mrs. Rebecca Luse Stump sang two of her best songs. Her full and sympathetic voice won the audience, which had to be satisfied by an encore. Then followed another flute solo. Space does not permit to make criticizing remarks about each and every number rendered by Mr. Schmedding; let it suffice to say that all of them found the best possible interpretation. Numerous encores were demanded of him by the appreciative audience, which expressed deep regrets to lose such an able and talented artist.

The duet for flute and violin, played by Mr. Lew Keyzer and Mr. Schmedding, had to be repeated. Clara Isabel Myren, pupil of Mrs. Horsfall, showed a decided advance since her recital a short time ago. Her touch and expression are more perfected. Mrs. Mayme Stanley Gidley, who sang Meyer-Helmund's "Magic Song," was in best form. Her voice sounded clear and true, rising at the climax to the high B, and enchanting her listeners. The well-earned applause brought forth an encore, equally well given. Mr. Keyzer is to be complimented upon the noble, expressive rendition of the "Meditation" from "Thais." The accompaniments were played by Mrs. Horsfall, who acquitted herself splendidly.

On the whole, the musicale was the musical affair of the season; the memory of which will linger long in the hearts of all who were present.

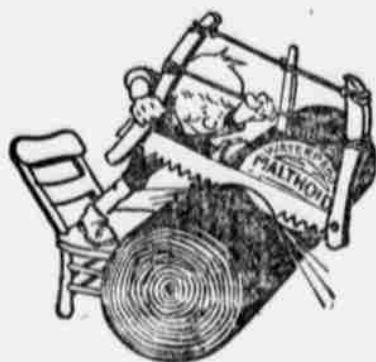
