CONFERENCE ON

Interstate Commission Measure Taken up at Meeting Today.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 11. The interstate trade commission bill and many amendments to it proposby Republicans and Democrats alike, were discussed at a White House conference today between the President and members of the Senate Committee on Interstate Commerce, Chairman Newlands said the amendment prescribing the powers of the commission to proceed with its investigations only by due process of law and deciding to establish the legal rule of gathering evidence was the main topic before the conference, Senators Lippitt and Oliver were the only Republicans who attended. They told the President they would continue to co-operate with the Democrats in framing legislation. Oliver and Lippitt want the trade commission's powers limited to prevent the publication of the affairs of any innocent corporation and would have the law guard against Hlegal search or seizure. Chairman Newlands asked Senator Oliver to draft such an amendment. Further conferences will take up the regulation of holding companies
