

# WHAT WOMEN WILL DO

### PROFESSOR CHARLES BEARD MAKES A PROPHECY ON SUFFRAGE—DISCUSSES METHODS OF MILITANTS.

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—Prof. Chas. Beard, who is in charge of the Department of Politics at Columbia University, believes the constitutional amendment for woman suffrage will succeed at the polls in 1915, but should it be defeated, the women should call a convention, elect women legislators and a governor and march upon Albany. The professor does not believe in militant methods, although he calls attention to the fact that an extension of freedom never has been granted to the English without rioting and violence. Mr. Beard says: "If all the women in New York would unite in creating a woman's government, they would be given their political rights without a shot being fired on either side. Not even a blow would be struck. Men could not help yielding to such an overwhelming plea by their mothers and daughters. The three leading political parties, Democrats, Republicans and Progressives, have shown a remarkable readiness to accede to the wishes of women. It only remains for the women to play their hand properly."

"I don't believe women will be a more emotional in politics than men. I have seen men deliberately smash silk hats, and I don't think any woman would smash her hat for the sake of a man who was trying to get to office. Most of the grafters are against giving woman any power in politics, but that in itself is a sign that they take women voters seriously. They are by nature a little more business than men. Most modern battles are won by brains, not brawn, and with the women of the state against the men, what couldn't they do? But the women who favor suffrage must first convince those women who do not."

### AGED COUPLE ELOPED

#### 88 and Girl 68 Run Away and Marry

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—Winifred Nettleton, of Bristol, Connecticut, the 88-year-old bridegroom married in Hartford, Connecticut, to a 68-year-old secretary, Mary Kathleen Baldwin, laughingly confessed to his arrival in New York that he and his bride had eloped.

"Yes," he said, "we eloped from Mrs. Baldwin's niece. That girl treated us like a couple of young lovers who did not know their own minds. She did not quite want us to marry, but we fooled her." Nettleton added that he had known the bride all his life, but did not quite believe able to persuade her to marry him until yesterday. The aged couple will complete their honeymoon in Florida.

### MIXED JURY "STAYS UP"

#### Eight Women on "Stubborn" Body and Only One Room Available

WATERBURY, Conn., Feb. 12.—A verdict had been returned tonight at a late hour in the case of Webb Peri and John Brown, accused of robbery, though the jury has been out since 5:30 o'clock last night. There are eight women on the jury, but there were no beds for them last night and no way of separating the men and women, so that they might rest. There are two jury-rooms. Cots are provided for twelve. Since the mixed jury system went into effect it has been the custom to allow the women to use one room and the men another, but last night there were juries out and both rooms occupied.

It was most pleasing in effect.

Another idea which has "caught on" is the blouse or coat of a rather vivid color worn with a dark velvet skirt.
