NINE FROZEN TO DEATH IN NEW YORK CITY THIS WEEK

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 13.—Although President Wilson's cold was better today, he kept to his room and the Cabinet meeting was cancelled.

NEW QUESTION IN GOOD ROADS

That there is a serious question as to the legality of the last petition asking the Coos county court to call a special election to submit the \$440,000 good roads bonding proposition, is the view of Judge Hall and the county commissioners.

Judge Hall said today that instead of 1250 signers, the petitions had a little over 1100. Of this number, eighteen had not registered at all, 292 had registered and over 700 had not registered in time to have their registrations filed with the county clerk prior to signing the petitions.

MORE SERIOUS RIOTING IN JAPAN

RURAL ROUTES TURNED DOWN

Congressman Hawley Writes That Inlet Service is Rejected Now

The proposal to have rural routes established on Coos River and some of the other inlets of the Bay has been turned down by the U. S. Post-office officials.

Senator Smith will probably take the matter up with some of the boat lines and have them put in their lowest bid for the service. If the boat lines will handle the mail service for \$25 per month or so, it is possible that the Postoffice department will order the routes established.

KILL ASIATIC BILL
COLUMBIA, S. C., Feb. 13.—The anti-Asian bill, directed against the ownership of land by Asiatics, was killed in the Senate today at the request of the author, following the failure of a similar bill to pass the lower house last night.

GORE TRIAL IS NOT OVER YET

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 13.—Counsel for Mrs. Minnie Bond, who is suing Senator Thomas P. Gore for \$50,000 as the result of an alleged assault in the Washington Hotel, rested their case today.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 13.—Five Senators were named in a special resolution today to co-operate with the Interstate Commerce Commission to investigate the affairs of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad and to get the information the railroad declined to give Federal agents.

EVERS STILL ON THE FENCE

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—James Gaffney, president of the Boston Nationals, announced after a conference today with Johnny Evers, the deposed manager of the Chicago Nationals, that Evers promised a definite answer today as to whether he would accept Gaffney's offer to play second base with the Boston team.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 13.—While President Charles R. Van Hise, of the University of Wisconsin, was testifying today before the House commerce committee, Representative Stevens, of Minnesota, ranking Republican of the committee, declared the administration of the Clayton bill for interstate trade commission, was unconstitutional in many respects.

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 13.—A statewide rally was held by the Republican state central committee, which ended in a banquet to celebrate Lincoln Day.

GREAT BRITAIN SENDS GUN TO MEXICO CITY FOR DEFENCE

STANLEY DOLLAR IS HERE TODAY
Well-known Lumberman Visits Here—Johnson Mills to Start Work Next Week

R. Stanley Dollar, of the Robert Dollar Lumber company of San Francisco, and Stanley Bartlett of the Randolph Mill, are in Marshfield today on business.

Nothing new has developed in connection with the defunct mill at Coquille, but it is expected that the Dollar company will buy it in and start operations as soon as the legal entanglements can be straightened out.

LINCOLN, Neb. Feb. 13.—The Nebraska Supreme Court in a decision today declared that the clause in the charter of the city of South Omaha providing that only union labor could be employed on public works, is void.

DELLA JEFFRIES DECLARED TO BE WIFE OF JAY WILCOX—NORTH BEND MEN SURETY

DELLA JEFFRIES, who was arrested at North Bend yesterday on an indictment of the U. S. District Court at Portland for "white slavery," furnished bail late yesterday afternoon and was granted her freedom pending her trial at the April or May term of Federal court.

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BERTILLION PASSES AWAY

PARIS, Feb. 13.—Alfonse Bertillon, creator of the Bertillon criminal identification system, died here today, aged 61 years.

KILLED TODAY BY DYNAMITE

J. McCormick, a laborer employed at Houser & Houser's camp at Sand Point, was instantly killed today by a stump hurled nearly 200 yards by a blast of dynamite.

Prior to touching off the blast all of the workmen were notified to seek safety and nearly all did so. McCormick appeared to be in a safe place, nearly 200 yards away, and did not seek protection.
