## EUGENE BOYS MUST BE GOOD

### District Attorney Starts in a Crusade Against Smoking and Pool Halls

EUGENE, Or., Feb. 13.—Boys under age who smoke on the streets, pool halls which admit minors and parents who consent to their children frequently pool halls will be the object of a law enforcement campaign of District Attorney J. M. Devers. He declares that the laws in these three instances are being flagrantly violated in Eugene, and that as many arrests as are necessary to put a stop to it will be made.

"I never was in a town," he declares, "where small boys use cigarettes as much as they do here. The law provides for their arrest and fine. The fine will necessarily fall upon the parents unless the latter propose to let the boy take his medicine."

"Nearly all of the pool halls in Eugene are violating the law right and left by allowing minor boys to play. So far as I am concerned, the District Attorney is going to stop it. Parents are continually complaining that their children are frequenting the pool halls and staying away from school and home."

"I think if we can stop some of these things we won't have so many criminals in the Circuit Court. Some of the criminals that we have to deal with continually start their career by hanging around these resorts as boys."

"Pool halls can be run within the law; and they can be absolutely legitimate so far as the law is concerned. Many of them are under the misapprehension that the parents can give consent to their boys frequenting the pool halls, which will relieve the halls. The law does not provide that parents can give such consent."

"If I find any instance where parents permit their boys to play in pool halls in violation of the law,

I shall prefer charges against those parents for contributing to the delinquency of minors.

"This thing of continually handling the product—the criminal—might just as well be stopped by taking care of our youngsters."

"And one other thing: Minors might just as well know that there is a heavy penalty—as high as a \$100 fine—for stating themselves to be of age in order to be allowed to play in a pool hall."

"Boys who smoke on the streets are also liable to arrest and fine. The law prohibits boys under fifteen from smoking on the streets or in public places—and this law is being violated right and left. And what's more, someone is furnishing these minors tobacco. I have nothing against the proprietors, but I have some interest in the boys."

### BEER IS RETURNED

#### Raid of Roseburg Eagles Declared To Be Wrong

ROSEBURG, Or., Feb. 13.—Holding that no sale had been made, and therefore the authorities had no right to retain the beer, which was confiscated by Officers T. J. Williams and I. Ketch, on Monday night, from the local order of Eagles Justice R. W. Masters, before whom a session of the Justice Court was held, ordered the confiscated liquor returned. District Attorney Brown, who examined several members of the lodge, who had a part in procuring the beer, was unable to prove that any unlawful action had been committed, or that any compensation was given in exchange therefor. The bottom seemed to drop out of the case as each witness told his story.

### LOTS OF BUTTER

#### Coquille Creamery Took in \$81,271.59 in Eleven Months

The Coquille Sentinel says: The stockholders of the Coquille Valley Creamery Company held their annual meeting at Woodman Hall. The old directors were re-elected as follows: W. H. Hull, president; J. P. Clausen, Charles McCurdy, C. C. Williams, D. K. Perkins. It was decided also to elect a manager, and Chas. Skeels was selected to fill that position. He will also perform the duties of secretary and treasurer. The salary of the manager was fixed at \$100 a month, and the amount of his bond was fixed at \$5000. The following summary of the business for the past eleven months was submitted by R. H. Mast, the secretary of the company:

Cash received and money due from sale of butter from Feb. 1, 1913, to Jan. 1, 1914, \$81,271.59.  
Average price paid for butter fat for the eleven months, \$352 per pound.  
Amount of butter fat received during the eleven months, 221,597 pounds.

The gross amount of butter manufactured for the year was considerably more than last year—about 10,000 pounds more in the eleven months than in the twelve months covered by the 1912 report.

### 1000-POUND EAGLE FLIES AWAY IN NEW YORK.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Feb. 12.—Park Foreman James Malone missed one of the big bronze eagles from the base of the Prison Ship Martyr's Monument. He could count but three, though positive there should be four. One of the monster birds had "flown." Investigation disclosed that men had unmounted the bird, rolled it down the embankment to the street and loaded it onto a push-cart. Malone notified the police and detectives followed the trail of the push-cart to a junk-shop. The detectives entered and found the eagle, minus its wings, perched on a forge, near which was a melting pot, with a fire beneath it. Sevtzky, the shop owner, says he bought the eagle from two men for \$24. They said they would bring him three more soon. Sevtzky was arrested on a charge of receiving stolen goods, and the park men are eagerly watching for the flight of the remaining three big birds from the monument.
