NEW YORK, Feb. 13 .- Life for the woman of fashion is truly one trying thing after another. Just when she has settled down to a process of economy because she has dis-covered that if she buys a dressy material she will not need much trim-ming, Dame Fashion announces that three-fourths of the sleeves on spring

and summer frocks will be short. This, of course, means that long gloves will have to be worn. Not only will the short dress sleeves need long gloves, but many of the new spring coat sleeves are wide at the wrist and others are made in three-quarters length, and this makes the
