Huerta Newspapers Severely Condemn U. S. Executive and Stand Taken

SCORE AMERICANS IN MANY ARTICLES TODAY

Objection of Charge 'Affairs O'Shaughnessy Not Given Any Heed.'

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 14.—In spite of a protest made by Nelson O'Shaughnessy, American Charge d'Affaires, and of instructions of the Mexican Foreign Office to desist from attacks on President Wilson, El Imparcial today bore a three-column first-page headline, "Woodrow Wilson lacks honor, as he does himself."
The article which follows comments on the recognition by the United States of the new Peruvian government within four days after the success of a recent revolt in that country. With similar prominence El Imparcial publishes an account of the alleged failure of 150 banks in Southern United States because of Wilson's "iniquitous Mexican policy."

WILSON IS BETTER.

President Able to Be Up and Around in His Room Today.

MURPHY SAYS HE HAS MEN

President of Chicago Cubs Says Sweeney and Perdue Have to Play on His Team

CHICAGO, Feb. 14.—"Sweeney and Perdue will play with the Chicago Cubs or nowhere," declared Charles W. Murphy of the Chicago Nationals today. "I have complete powers concluding the deal in my own hands," said Murphy. "I have no more to do with the matter. I have my bootblack and no organization of men shall be permitted to interfere with this deal."
Murphy said that telegrams had been sent to Sweeney at Houston and Perdue at Gallatin, Texas, ordering them to report at Chicago next Monday evening to go with the Cubs to Tampa for training. Concerning his plans made yesterday to file suit against Dan Johnson, President of the American League, on account of Johnson's alleged attacks on Murphy, the latter said he had not changed his intention.

A. COOLEY IS FOUND DEAD

OWNER OF CURRY COUNTY AND BROTHER OF RILEY COUNTY MURDER, ACCUSED OF VAN PELT MURDER, DIES SUDDENLY.

GOLD BEACH, Or., Feb. 14.—J. A. Cooley, one of the earliest pioneers of Harbor, was found dead in his home at his wife's home. He was a brother of Riley Cooley, who was recently arrested in San Francisco for the Van Pelt murder fifteen years ago. Heart disease is believed to have been the cause and death was without a struggle.
Mr. Cooley was one of the oldest citizens of the Coos Valley. He was the eldest son of one of the early pioneer families of Curry county, and was about 68 years of age. Besides an aged mother, who resides in the Coos Valley, he leaves an aged wife and a large family, all of whom are grown, two brothers and two sisters in California, Henry and Riley Cooley and Mrs. Harris and Mrs. Edith Scott, J. D. and W. J. Cooley and Mrs. J. W. Morrison of this county.

He has brought all his secretaries to Pocantico Hills and everything indicates that he has settled down for an indefinite stay there.

MINISTER IS AID TO GORE

Oklahoma Senator Offers Evidence to Impeach Mrs. Bond's Witnesses

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 14.—Senator Gore did not take the stand today in the damage suit of Mrs. Bond as was expected, but testimony was offered to impeach the testimony of the witnesses for the prosecution. Rev. R. D. Licklider, pastor of the Olivet Baptist church, testified that Mrs. Bond and her husband tried to induce the Ministerial Alliance of Oklahoma City to make an effort to get the case of Gore before the United States Senate. The Alliance, after hearing their statements, voted to have nothing to do with the case.

CANDIDATES IN CURRY COUNAY

W. H. Meredith to Run for Congress With Folk's Aid—Loney to Run

According to the Port Orford Tribune, W. H. Meredith, District Attorney for Curry County, has practically decided to enter the race for the Democratic nomination for Congress from this district and formal announcement will be made soon. Concerning him, the Tribune says: "W. H. Meredith is a forceful and eloquent speaker, a good mixer, and a man who knows how to get what he goes after. He is familiar with the needs of this section of Oregon, and that he has faith in its future is evidenced by the fact that he has real estate. His intimate friendship with men in close touch with the Wilson administration would give him added prestige and influence at Washington. Among these are ex-Governor Folk and Champ Clark, the former having written to Meredith that if he was nominated for Congress he will come to Oregon and make a number of speeches in his behalf."

Loney to Run.

It is announced that E. J. Loney, cashier of the Bank of Port Orford, has decided to enter the race for State Representative from Coos and Curry counties on the Democratic ticket. S. P. Pierce of Curry county is now joint representative. Mr. Loney is a Republican. It is not expected that Pierce will run again.

For Sheriff.

E. J. Baker, district deputy game warden, has also announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for sheriff. He is well known on Coos Bay and it is said that he is pretty apt to land the plum.

SNOW STORM SWEEPS NEW YORK

Over Seven Inches Fell in Gotham Last Night and Hurts Business—Two More Deaths.

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—The first big snow storm of the winter hit New York City today. Snow began to fall at 6 o'clock last night and continued steadily today. Seven

inches of snow had fallen in New York this morning and it was drifted in places to more than two feet. All trains, particularly those from the West, are late. The attendance at the stock exchange was the smallest for any Saturday since last summer. Robert McKinn of Bayonne, New Jersey, died of exposure while standing on the platform of a train. The body of an unidentified man was found in a hallway in Third avenue, where he had sought shelter.

WELBORN TELLS SAY SOCIALISTS OF MINE CLASH CAUSED STRIKE

President of Colorado Fuel and Iron Company Witness at Denver Today

"Yes," replied Welborn.
"And yet you would not meet the officers of the United Mine Workers for the sake of preventing this strike?"
"No."

Michigan Mining Companies Give New Reason For Labor Troubles There

HANKOCK, Mich., Feb. 14.—"We cannot recognize the Western Federation of Miners because it is socialistic in its aims and tendencies and because it is made up in this district largely of Socialists," said A. F. Rees, of the counsel for the mining companies at the congressional strike investigation today. The statement was made in explanation of a question asked of a witness, to which A. W. Kerr, of the counsel for the copper mine strikers objected, on the ground that it was part of an effort to show that the strike was fostered and fanned by red socialism. It was the same question asked of another witness yesterday, arousing similar objections: "Are you a member of the Finnish Socialist party?"
"At the inception of the strike," said Kerr, "the mining companies made no claims that it was being conducted by red socialism. They set up that cry a few weeks ago, when every other resort had been exhausted."

The committee decided that the witness need not answer the question unless he desired. The witness, John Jauhunen, said he did not belong to the society. He said that the ventilation in the Quincy mine, where he had worked as trapper, was very poor and the heat on the lower levels was indescribable.

"Without wishing to reflect personally upon Welborn, I think he is too ignorant to be the employer of 6000 mine workers," said Brewster.

JAPS KILLED THREE FRIENDS

Accused Man in Jail at Chehalis Admits Triple Murder Over Gambling

CHEHALIS, Wash., Feb. 14.—M. Mayawaga, a Japanese laborer, in jail here, confessed today that he and a countryman named Yamoto killed three Japanese mill hands at Wellville, Pacific county, last November and December after disputes over gambling and over a Japanese woman in Tacoma. The bodies were buried in the woods.

PLAN TO RUSH RAILWAY WORK

Foreman Benson of Houser & Houser to Open Camps From Ten Mile to Bay

Swan Benson, now in charge of the Coos Bay division of the construction work on the Coos Bay Eugene line of the Southern Pacific, left this afternoon for Portland to complete arrangements for rushing to construction between the Ten Mile tunnel and Sand Point. Mr. Benson was advised that the work was to be opened up all along the line just as soon as possible.

In order to facilitate the construction, it is understood that Houser & Houser, who have the sub-contract on this end, will also take charge of the clearing which was to have been done direct by the Southern Pacific. Additional camps will be put in and the grading hastened as fast as the weather will permit.

Work Near Gardiner.

A. E. Adelsperger arrived home yesterday from a trip north and came in via Gardiner. He reports that they are now prosecuting the work in both directions from the Umquica and he understood they were preparing to rush it.

Send Out Men.

Burt Doremus today sent out twenty-four more laborers to the Sand Point camp, making a crew of about seventy engaged in the steam shovel and grading work there. About twenty-five men quit work there yesterday because the company advanced the price of board to eighty-five cents a day, although only \$2 is being paid for laborers.

MANY EDITORS ARE ARRESTED FOR ARTICLES

House of Peers Expresses Views on Naval Scandals—More Trouble Soon

TOKIO, Feb. 14.—The Japanese government took extensive measures today for the suppression of the disturbances in connection with demonstrations of protest against an increase of taxation. A line of police armed with sabres, was drawn up around Parliament buildings. Several opposition newspaper editors were arrested on charges of inciting the populace to riot. In the hours of Peers an interpellation was addressed to the government in connection with the naval scandal. In the course of debate, Baron Kenjiro Den censured Admiral Baron Minoru Saito, Minister of Marine, for not investigating affairs earlier.

DEATH ANNOUNCED IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—Senator Bacon's death was announced to the Senate, which passed a brief resolution and adjourned. Senator Bacon had been ill from an affection of the kidneys less than a month. His death came unexpectedly from a blood clot on the heart. Bacon was in his seventy-fifth year. He was chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee of the Senate. He was the first Senator to be elected under the new constitutional amendment for popular election.
