Wants Bath Money.—L. E. Bliven today filed suit with Justice Pennock against Chas. Tower for \$26.50 which Bliven claims Tower owes him for Turkish baths. Bliven says Tower only paid \$5 on a bill for \$31.50. Tower formerly ran a movie picture show here, but has been at Bandon. Bliven thought that Tower was going to leave on the Breakwater today and had Constable Cox waiting for him.

May Change Boats.—According to a report, the Santa Clara may be put on the Coos Bay-Eureka-Portland run if the Alliance is put on the Alaska run next month as reported. The Eureka has been put on the Santa Clara's run on the California coast. Harry Reynolds says that the Santa Clara has about the best passenger accommodations of any boat on the coast. She has about the same speed as the Redondo.

Can't Locate Relatives.—Coroner Fred Wilson has been unable to locate the relatives of J. McCormick, the laborer who was killed by a stump buried by a dynamite blast at Sand Point yesterday. When McCormick was here previously he received considerable mail, but the last time he received none. No letters were found on him and where his luggage is Mr. Wilson has not found out. McCormick's friends differ as to whether his home was in Maine, Kentucky or California.

Watkins' Age.—Geo. Watkins has shield his caster into the ring as a defender of women's right—that is to keep secret their ages. The new registration law was supposed to compel them to tell just how old they are and some were not availing themselves of the right of the ballot. So when Judge Watkins registered the other day, he gave his age to Justice Pennock as "over 21." However, the blank failed to pass muster of the eagle eye of James Watson, County Clerk, who is a bachelor and probably interested in ascertaining the ages of eligible women. So he sent the blank back to Justice Pennock to get the exact age. Watkins says he won't give it and if the exact age is not required in a marriage license it shouldn't be in a registration list. So there. But it is a tie to one shot that Watson will stand out and require all voters to give their exact age until Watkins or some other gallant spends enough money to get the Oregon Supreme Court to say that the law doesn't mean what it says.
