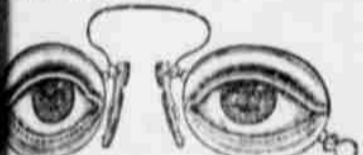

PETER MARS, RESIDENT HERE FOR FORTY YEARS, SUCCEUMS TO OLD AGE AT HIS RANCH HOME.

## ROAD ELECTION ON MAY 15TH

PETITIONS WITHDRAWN BY ASSOCIATION AND WILL BE FILED AGAIN IN APRIL—VOTE AT PRIMARY ELECTION.

COQUILLE, Or., Feb. 16.—The Coos County Good Roads Association today withdrew their petition asking the County Commissioners to call a special election to admit the \$440,000 bond issue and agreed to file it again at the April term of court when the question will be ordered submitted at the primary election May 15.

The action followed a long discussion and conference. The county commissioners pointed out that nothing could be gained by calling a special election in advance of that date and that the special election would cost in the neighborhood of \$3000.

President Morrison wanted the commissioners to arrange the preliminaries, like having the survey made, etc., while the bond issue was being floated, but the County Commissioners would not agree to this.
