



FOR EXHIBIT AT FRISCO FAIR

L. J. Simpson Writes From San Francisco of Necessity For Prompt Action

That Coos county should take immediate steps towards having a big exhibit in its own building at the Panama Exposition in San Francisco next year is the belief of L. J. Simpson, who is now in San Francisco. Mr. Simpson has already secured an option on a site and on his return here will start a campaign for a fine exhibit there. In a letter to the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, he says:

"Believing that it is of greatest importance to have the Coos county exhibit at the Panama-Pacific Exposition in 1915 housed in its own 'Coos County, Oregon' building, I am obtaining from the Fair Commissioners the refusal of a suitable site for such a building, to be built out of Coos county materials with Coos county labor to house Coos county exhibits. Upon my return to Coos county I shall present the matter in detail to your honorable body for your consideration. Would it not be well to give such a project considerable publicity and try to stir up some enthusiasm on the subject? It will be Coos county's golden opportunity and I feel confident the people will not permit it to slip by."

WANT COUNTY TO AID FAIR

Myrtle Point Organization Asks for \$500 Appropriation—New Directors Chosen

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: 149 shares of the capital stock of the Coos & Curry County Fair Association were represented, either by the owners in person or by proxy, at the annual meeting of the association held at the rooms of the Myrtle Club. The report of Treasurer M. O. Stemmler showed that during the year 1913 the directors had been enabled to take up the note for \$900, the balance of the indebtedness account of the purchase price of the grounds.

The building of exhibit pavilion and stock barn, which was deferred last year because of the indebtedness against the grounds, is embodied in the first resolution. The resolution reads:

Resolved, that the Board of Directors of the Coos & Curry County Fair Association be, and they are hereby instructed to build a two story building on the fair grounds. The upper or second floor to be dedicated to the Coos County Industrial Fair, and the lower part of the building to be used as an exhibit hall, and they are further directed and instructed to provide sufficient buildings for the accommodation of all live stock that may be exhibited at the fair held during this year.

The second reads as follows:

Resolved, that the Board of Directors be instructed to use their best endeavors with the County Court of Coos County to make an appropriation of not less than \$500 to be used in the payment of premiums exhibited at the Industrial Fair by school children.

The following were chosen as a board of directors for the ensuing year: R. C. Dement, M. O. Stemmler, H. A. Schroeder, L. A. Roberts, E. S. Dement, J. L. Carey of Coquille and A. E. Adelsperger of Marshfield.
