L. A. Liljeqvist Says That Douglas County's Share of Highway is Worst

L. A. Liljeqvist, district attorney, who has just returned from Salem via the Myrtle Point wagon road, declares that he is now firmly convinced that the thing for Coos county to do on its good road work is to confine itself to internal improvements, that is, build good highways connecting up the principal towns in the county before bothering about trying to get an outside trunk line connection.

The reason for this belief is the condition of the Douglas County roads. He says they are almost beyond belief. It took him from 6 o'clock in the morning until 9:30 at night to cover the distance between Roseburg and the Coos-Douglas county line.

He says that the Coos county end of the road is much better than the Douglas county end. For a short distance out of Roseburg they are able to use autos on the stage line. He says that the Douglas county court and the majority of the Roseburg people according to the best information he was able to obtain, are now committed to the Drain route which Warren Reed is advocating. So evident has this become that he says the people at Olalla held a mass meeting the other night and the 100 or more in attendance passed resolutions declaring that they would oppose all county candidates who were not committed to the improvement of their highway. He says that he was informed that the county court at Roseburg was taking the view that to fix up the Myrtle Point road would be simply to aid contractors Laird and Barnard.

Until Douglas county does something about fixing up its part of the highway he thinks that Coos county should confine its efforts to road building to connect up the principal points in this county.

TO LOAD COAL FOR SIUSLAW

Barge Lawrence, Will Take on Six Hundred Tons for Railroad Work

This will be the first recent shipment of coal from here to Port Townsend for the railroad construction work and will probably be followed by others. Considerable coal will be needed for the steam shovel which will be operated between the Siu-Slaw and Coos Bay this season and it will probably keep the barge pretty busy. The Gleaner will take the Lawrence back to the Siu-Slaw.
