Laying Steel.—According to a report from Eugene, the laying of steel was resumed on the west side of the Notli tunnel last week and will soon be half way to tidewater.

Organizing Band.—H. W. Sanford of Sumner reports that he is assisting in the organization of a band at that place. The band will hereafter furnish music for the dances given by the Sumner Hall Association.

For Literature.—Dr. J. T. McCormac, who is now at Berkeley, writes to the Chamber of Commerce that he has many inquiries about this section and asks that a number of booklets be sent him for distribution.

Court Tomorrow.—Judge Coke will hold a special session of circuit court at Coquille tomorrow to hear equity cases. The principal case scheduled to come up is the suit to test the validity of the Port of Bandon.

Transfers Interest.—J. W. Motley has transferred his half interest in lot 1, block 3, South Marshfield, known as the Seaman property, to Minnie E. Stadelman. This is part of the Pletch or estate, Mrs. Stadelman being one of the heirs.

Farmers' Union.—A meeting of the Farmers' Union Saturday was well attended and the co-operative movement given an impetus. It is proposed to start with \$5000 capital, the shares being \$25 each and no one being permitted to own more than four shares.

Council Wednesday.—The Marshfield City Council will meet next Wednesday night. The date was originally set for Tuesday, but many of the members wanted to attend the Fellowship Club banquet and so it was decided to let matters go over until Wednesday.

Argue Case.—Judge Coke Saturday heard arguments on the demurrer which the City of Marshfield filed in the case of A. B. Manly of Portland, who is seeking to avoid a paving assessment on South Fourth street. The controversy was thrashed out in the Council some time ago.

Close Store.—Manager Theo. Wold of the Western Outfitting company Saturday night received a telegram ordering him to crate up the old stock and ship it to San Francisco at once. He will accompany the stock on the next Redondo and while there will select a new stock and hopes to return to the Bay with it soon.

Was Guest Only.—George Ross of Catching Inlet, who was in Marshfield Saturday stated that someone got mixed in their account of the K. P. anniversary doings at Coquille. Mr. Ross was present simply as a guest and ex-Senator Chase presided. The meeting was a fine one, he says. Mr. Ross was formerly District Deputy Grand Chancellor, but no longer holds that position.

Said Remembrance.—The Biltmore boys on Coos Bay have sent a fine gold watch charm and chain to Dr. Schenck as a little token of their appreciation of his efforts in their behalf. The charm is handsomely engraved and one side bears the Biltmore school emblem. Accompanying it is a letter expressing the regret of the Biltmore men that the school had to be discontinued and the hope that it would be revived later.

Made Threats.—F. D. Busselt or Hibbett was arrested Friday night for insanity and is still confined in the city jail. He was making threats to kill people and had a 38-calibre revolver on him. He first came to the station and then went to Marshal Carter's house. The latter knew him slightly and at once realized something was wrong. En route to the station he wanted to take a shot at two or three different people but was

prevailed upon not to do so. It is said that he is suffering from delirium tremens.

Miller and the other by the Flanagan & Bennett bank. The court held that there wasn't sufficient notice of sale and that there were other defects in the proceedings and also that the price of \$3144.00, for which the Flanagan & Bennett bank bid it in was inadequate. The Stutsmans were recently compelled to vacate the property and have been living in a tent nearby, but this order puts a new phase on the situation.

PLAN RAILWAY WORK

Porter Bros. to Build Temporary Line to Haul Supplies. The Florence West says: Porter Brothers are to build a warehouse and wharf at Glenada to store supplies for their railroad work. Their plans include building a temporary railroad from Glenada to Whoahink Lake and a short line from Whoahink to Talttecos. A barge with motive power will be placed on each lake. Cars can be loaded at Glenada, taking out over the road to Whoahink Lake, transported across that body of water on the barke, taken thence to Talttecos, then across that lake and unloaded at the camps where the supplies are needed.
