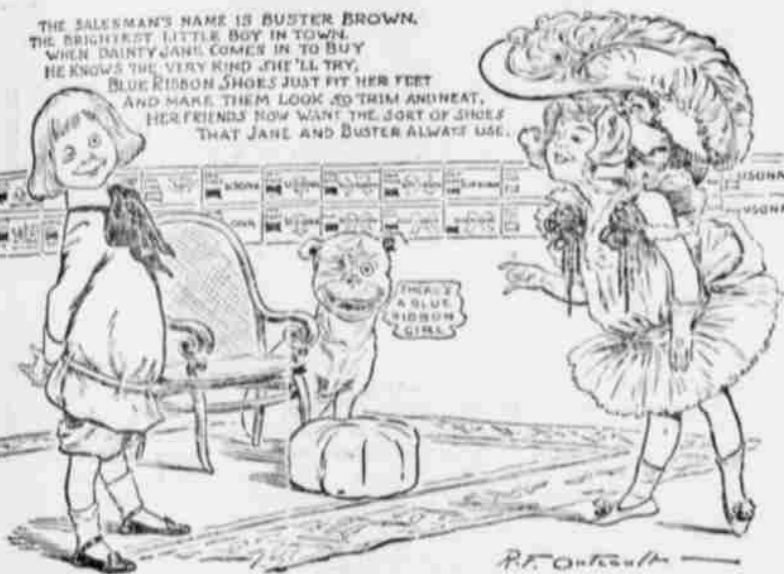

Court Today.—Judge J. S. Coke went to Coquille this morning to hold the adjourned term of circuit court for equity cases. The Bandon port test case is the principal one to come up and may require a couple of days to try it.

Monrovia, Cal., Suffered Severely From Recent Storm.
