

MITCHELL IS A REAL MAYOR

New York Executive Continues Activity—Many Idle Men There

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—Mayor Mitchell continues to do things. He greatly resembled former President Roosevelt in that he keeps constantly in the public eye, though, perhaps, with less studied effort. Most marked in its advance over the way of running the city government hitherto is the reorganization of the Board of Estimate, effected by Mayor Mitchell within the first few weeks of his administration. The division of work among a number of standing committees is a move toward thorough consideration of measures and questions prior to action by the ruling body of the city. Instead of the Board of Estimate being a mere dam, impounding a flood of measures for the spending of city money, it is to be a looking-forward body, dealing constructively along the lines of a definite city plan forming and carrying out comprehensive policies, as in the development of the city's port facilities.

Advertisers for Wife.

Ever hear of Norwood, Long Island? Well, you've got nothing on the 6,501,709 rent payers in greater New York City and its Westchester and New Jersey suburbs. From now on, however, Norwood, L. I. is officially on the map. Samuel Shannon, veteran of Chancellorsville and Bull Run, has placed it there. He has done it by an ad in the newspapers stating that he would like to have a wife. She must be respectable, must love a good home and not mind a husband who is only two years removed from four-score. There has been no report of congested traffic in front of Samuel Shannon's home, but his ad continued to run daily, in addition to the free notices that he gets. The few who have applied say that the bashful wooer needs all the help he can get through the newspapers and any other source.

For Jury Service

A lot of folks who have been escaping jury duty because they came under the exempt class will have to serve just the same as ordinary citizens, if reforms urged by the State Bar Association are put into effect. At present clergymen, editors, reporters, newspaper artists, telegraphers, men employed in glass, cotton and woolen factories, etc., are exempt from jury duty, as well as state officials, judges, doctors, lawyers, policemen, firemen, masters, engineers, assistants and firemen on steam vessels and national guardsmen.

Many Idle Men

The question of how the city can co-operate with private charitable institutions to care for women lacking employment is being considered by Mayor Mitchell and his advisers. According to a recent bulletin of the New York State Department of Labor, of 600,000 organized wage earners there were 101,140 persons idle on September 30, 1913. The bulletin states that with one exception, this is the greatest number of unemployed reported in any year during the last seventeen years, and probably larger than during any previous year. The proportion of unemployed—16.1 per cent—was exceeded during the last seventeen years only in 1908, when it was 22.5 per cent. Applying this percentage to the unorganized wage earners, it is estimated that the total number of unemployed in New York State on September 30, 1913, was 300,000. Of these 10,000 are women.

Power Boat Race

The American Power Boat Association will hold a meeting during the month, and members of the Yachtsmen's Club will be on hand, booming its annual race to Bermuda. Several motorboat men who are interested in trying to win back from England the British International trophy will talk ways and means during the week and a syndicate of Philadelphia yachtsmen is expected to make a selection of a motor to be used in a high speed boat now building.

A WOMAN SEA CAPTAIN

DENMARK HAS THE ONLY ONE IN SERVICE COMMANDING A VESSEL RUNNING TO ENGLAND— MAY COME TO AMERICA.

COPENHAGEN, Feb. 28.—Promotion to a steamer in the American service has been promised to Mrs. von Bauditz, Denmark's only woman sea captain, who is now commanding a vessel running between Russia and England.

Mrs. von Bauditz, who is the wife of a physician, was for a long time interested in yachting as a sport and after passing an examination for a master's license she took up the sea as a profession. So adept did she prove herself that a local shipping company soon gave her command of one of its largest steamers. Captain von Bauditz wears a natty uniform with square cut coat and skirt of the same material. She is the first female captain in Denmark and claims to be the only real feminine master mariner in the world.

Danish Folk Dance.

Several American teachers are here studying the old Danish folk dances with the idea of substituting them for gymnastics in girls' schools in America. In this city a big society has been formed for the preservation and promotion of Danish national dances. This movement was so widespread that it attracted the attention of Americans visiting here and resulted in the visit of the American teachers, who express themselves as delighted with the quaint dances. The teachers complain that gymnastics become very tiresome and boring to girls, and they believe that the dances will confer all of the benefits of the gymnastics and at the same time be a great source of pleasure to the students.

Building At Frisco.

Anton Rosen, a local architect, has furnished plans for the building which will be erected at the San Francisco Exposition from a fund collected by Danish Americans. The building will be modeled on the famous castle of Hamlet's town, Elsinore, and like its historical prototype, will be situated on the sea. The building will not be used to house exhibits, which will be placed in another structure erected by the Danish government, but will be used as a headquarters by Danish Americans and their friends visiting the Exposition. The structure will contain a big recital hall, reception rooms and offices. For the official Danish exhibition a splendid site has been procured and it is planned to make the exhibit small but typical of the very best of Danish art and industry.

Plan Art Palace.

Dr. Carl Jacobsen, Denmark's great art patron, just before his death confided to a friend that he intended to create a Danish Versailles, and the publication of the plan has led to the determination to carry out his ideas as a memorial of his services to the nation. The large sum to make the plan a success will be available from the Carlsberg fund, which was instituted by Jacobsen and to which he donated many millions for the encouragement and promotion of art in Denmark.

The Versailles, as planned by Dr. Jacobsen, will be erected in Frederiksberg, where the beautiful castle of that name with its extensive gallery of art and national historical treasures is already located. In connection with the castle all of the skill of the landscape artist and sculptor

Great Water Power.

An English company is planning to harness Dettifoss, one of the largest waterfalls in Iceland, with the plan of turning its estimated 410,000 horse power into an agency to extract fertilizer from the atmosphere. The engineers estimate that the falls will develop more power than the works at Hardangerfjord and Odda in Norway. The engineers say they will have no difficulty in producing calcareous saltpeter fertilizer from the air. The electric power will be transmitted to a nearby port, where splendid shipping facilities exist, and where factories for the production of the fertilizer will be built.
