**Change Headquarters.**—The Eugene Guard says says that the H. M. Eylesby Company, owners of the Oregon Power company, have changed their Oregon headquarters from Portland to Eugene.

**Council Tonight.**—The Marshfield City Council will meet this evening to take up various city matters, including the question of reducing the appropriation of the Coos Bay Band from \$150 to \$100 per month.

**Put in Tidegate.**—The city fire engine has been kept busy today pumping out the water at the mouth of the Mill Slough drain to permit the installation of a tidegate at the mouth of the drain.

Mooney, of St. Mary's, Ohio, sends the news of the confirmation of his appointment by the Senate of the United States to the position of Minister to Paraguay, the South American Republic. The position was created at the recent session of Congress. Mr. Noonan studied law in the office of Senator Mooney, at St. Marys, Ohio, fifteen years ago. Senator Mooney is chairman of the Finance Committee of the Ohio state senate at the present session. He has been a prominent factor in the political life of Ohio for the past ten years.
