SAFETY BOXES IN NEW SAFE

BLANCO CIGAR STORE INSTALS NEW CONVENIENCE FOR MARSHFIELD BUSINESS MEN AND OTHERS — MAKE LOW RATE.

The Blanco Cigar Store has just installed a new fire and burglar-proof safe which contains thirty-two safety deposit boxes, which will be for rent to business men and others needing the new convenience.

The boxes will be available seven days a week, from 7 o'clock in the morning until midnight. At present the only safety deposit vaults here now are those in the banks, which are available only during banking hours.

The safety deposit boxes are large and will hold almost any size document in addition to money or other valuables. Each box has a key of its own. In addition to this key, there is a master key necessary to open the boxes.

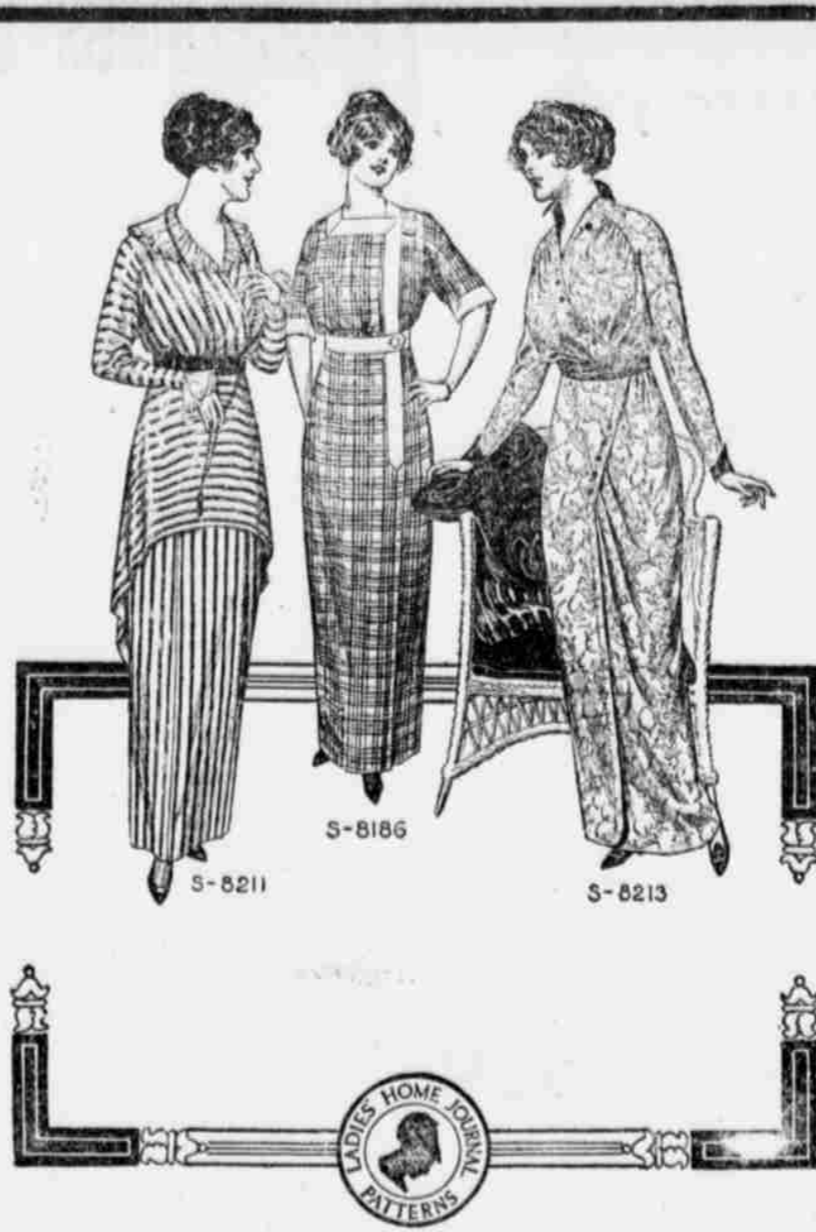
Business men who have to carry over considerable cash at the close of each day's business or over Sunday will especially find the new safety deposit boxes advantageous.

Box "thirteen" is omitted from the safety deposit vaults as so many fear the "hoodoo thirteen" that the safe-makers have found it useless to include a box number 13, so they just skip it.

Messrs. Bradley and Owen, of the Blanco Cigar Store, expect the safety deposit feature to grow rapidly and will install additional safes and boxes as they are needed.

He struck the wrong bird, in the person of Fred Hansen at a saloon Monday afternoon, who refused to abide by Murphy's advice to remain away from another James Murphy namesake, who Murphy was offering his usual guidance too, and in the case of his funds being almost exhausted Murphy tried to keep the said Hansen from drinking with himself and pal. Hansen insisted and a fight ensued in which Murphy rushed to the outside of the building followed by Hansen. Both started to fight and Chief Carter arrived in time to take both men to the city jail at the end of round 1. The fight occurred at the corner of North Front street and Alder avenue.

CHEESE FACTORY REPORT

The report of the Parkersburg Cheese Company for the period commencing March 17th and ending November 17th, 1913, shows the following figures: Total lbs. of milk received 954,445 Total lbs. butter fat 38,854 Total lbs. cheese 105,347 Money recd. for cheese \$15,728.91 Total expense for manufacturing the cheese, telegrams, postage, secretary work and freight on twenty tons to Bandon was \$2,178.25. The price paid for butter fat ranged from 35 cents to 41.6 cents per hundred.

SHIP SPUDS TO CALIFORNIA

James Landrith Brings Down 250 Sacks Today—Expect Better Market

A barge load of potatoes, 250 sacks in all, arrived in tow of the launch Express today, from the ranch of James Landrith on South Coos River. The barge was unloaded on the Alliance dock to be shipped to San Francisco on the outgoing Redondo. The shipment is consigned to Marshall Taggart & Company, of San Francisco. "If the market at San Francisco remains steady as it is now," said Mr. Landrith, "I am sure there will be a sudden rise in Burbank potatoes by the time my consignment lands there." The potatoes are of an unusually large size and observers have pronounced them the largest seen in these quarters for some time past. California offers a good market for Coos Bay shippers and I believe this season will see many shipments, some much larger than I am sending."
