A STUDEBAKER HERE TOMORROW

The 1914 Studebaker Four Touring Car Will Arrive on Breakwater

The first Studebaker four touring car ever seen in Coos county will arrive tomorrow on the Breakwater consigned to George Goodrum. It is the new 1914 model, with electric starter, electric lights and complete equipment and sells at \$1175 in Marshfield.

Studebaker builds but one four-cylinder touring car. This car, produced in immense quantities and of the very highest quality of material and workmanship, embodies a degree of durability, beauty and efficiency that has won for it the title, "The Last Word in Fours."

It has a full floating axle, is started and lighted by its own automatic electrical system, drives from the left seat and carries, in touring form, five passengers anywhere that an automobile can go.

Among the distinctive features of the Studebaker four are four cylinders, motor cast en-bloc; long stroke, small bore, proportioned to secure maximum efficiency from each gallon of fuel; displacement, 192.6 cubic inches; moving parts balanced to prevent vibration; valves enclosed to ensure quiet and protect from dust.

Control—Standard type with left steer, center levers. Rear Axle—Full floating; shafts relieved of all strain except that of driving the car. Brakes—Two on each rear hub; either able alone to easily lock both

MANY COWS IN COOS TESTS

J. L. Smith Reports 800 Entered in Coos—Big Difference in Product

More than 800 cows have been signed for record-keeping by farmers and dairymen of Coos county. At a cost of \$1.25 per year for each cow the owner will be able to tell at the end of the year just how much milk she produced and just what its butter fat content was.

This is what Professor W. A. Barr, United States and College Extension worker, tells girls and boys in his industrial club circular, just issued by the Oregon Extension division of the Oregon Agricultural College. The first page contains a picture of two cows, one of which, Professor Barr tells us, returned \$30.83 worth of milk and butter for \$38.24 worth of feed, and the other returned \$123.68 worth of milk for \$45.83 worth of feed.

SEVENTY HURT IN ONE WEEK

Two Fatalities in Oregon Industries Reported Last Week—Marshfield Accident

SALEM, Or., March 4.—Two accidents were reported to State or Commissioner O. P. Holt last week, and seventy others, all the way from a broken rib, broken ribs, from a cut finger, lacerated eye. Hugh Leppington killed at St. Helena while engaged logging, and Edward Johnson killed at Marshfield while engaged in the paper mill. Twelve accidents occurred in the paper in the state, most of them at City. The Marshfield accident reported for the week were as follows: Edward Johnson, fatal, paper mill; T. H. Graves, chest injured, ging.
