





More than 800 cows have been signed for record-keeping by farmers and dhirymen of Coos county. At a cost of \$1.25 per year for each cow the owner will be able to tell at the end of the year just how much milk she produced and just what its butter fat content was. Great interest is reported by J. L. Smith, O. A. C. and Coos county farm assistant.

"You may be able to keep a dog or a pet that doesn't pay for its living, but you cannot afford to keep a cow that doesn't pay for her living.

This is what Professor W. A. Barr, United States and College Extension worker, tells girls and boys in his incustrial club circular, just issued by the Oregon Extension division of he Oregon Agricultural College. The
