GRANT TWO DIVORCES.



MANY WANT TO VOTE.


Seventeen Apply for Naturalization News of City-by-the-Sea as Told by in Coos County the Recorder

In the circuit court of Coos.county now there are seventeen applicants for naturalization waiting their final papers. These cases had been set for hearing on April 24, but on Tuesday Judge Coke, in view of that date being within less than ninety days of the May primaries, postponed the hearing until May 24. Of the seven-teen prospective citizens only one balls from Compile hails from Coquille. The following are the nationalities represented: Finland, 6; Germany, 3; Norway, 2; Italy, 1; Canada, 1; England, 1; Greece, 1; Isle of Crete, 1; Denmark, 1.

Since the new national law in regard to naturalization was enacted in 1906, 301 men have been made citizens of the United States in the circuit court of Coos county .--- Co-guille Sentinel.
