JUDGE HALL ON ROAD PROBLEM

Says That Proposed Plan Will Be Wasteful and In Vain—Favors Trunk Line

Judge John F. Hall has written a letter to the Coquille Sentinel in which he answers some criticism of the action of the County Court on the recent good roads petitions and in his letter he goes on to give his opinion of the proposed highway as follows:

"Your article stated Judge Hall said the route proposed for the crossing of Ten Mile Creek, between Marshfield and the Umpqua was not a good one. Well, this is news to me. Ten Mile Creek was never mentioned to my knowledge in any way, and I never said anything of the kind. I did make the following remarks: 'I do not approve of the plan in petition for the distribution of the funds in this—that is the money to be raised by bonds. To distribute this money as asked for will cut the fund into five separate parcels. The total amount of mileage, if we build a permanent road, would be about twenty-five miles. Of this five or six miles would be built between Myrtle Point and Bridge; then you would run into a mudhole. About six or seven miles would be built between Bandon and the Curry County line; at the end of this another mud hole. About four or five miles from Coquille towards Marshfield, another mudhole. About four or five miles from Marshfield towards Coquille and another mud hole; about three or four miles from Cooson around Glasgow Point toward Ten Mile, I stated that there would be no mudhole on this piece or at either end, for the reason that it would not connect with any other road. The Ten Mile people could not use it, and there is no one living around Glasgow to use it hence there would be no mud hole.'

"To divide the money as asked would be impractical. I stated that if the bonds were issued the Ten Mile people were entitled to some recognition, but I told those present Monday that I thought the money, if it was divided, should be put on some road that is used, so that the people would receive some benefit. I stated that I believed the proper way to dispose of the funds or bond money, if carried, was to put it on some trunk line."

SPANKING VS. NEGLECT.

Win their confidence and treat them as 'pals.' Parents are not always to blame for their sons' delinquencies, but they often plead ignorance of the law when they know they are in the wrong; and they are much harder to deal with." Anyway, little Tommy can no longer wall. "They never blame nobody but me." Judge Hoyt does.

SPORTSMEN TO HOLD MEETING

Oregon Organization to Regulate Sports—In Portland March 16th.

PORTLAND, Or., March 4.—Delegates from organizations of sportsmen in all parts of the state will meet at Portland, Monday, March 16, 1914, to form a state association. There are now fifty-four clubs of hunters and fishermen in Oregon. The overwhelming majority of the sportsmen are in favor of the protection of fish and game, and the improvement of the game resources of the state. It will be the purpose of the state association to work along the lines of game protection, to agree upon legislation in order to bring that about, and to exert the united influence of the sportsmen of the state to procure the passage of such legislation.

The objects which the organized sportsmen have in view are particularly close to the heart of each angler and hunter, because of the fact that the fund of \$100,000 or more annually used for fish and game protection and propagation, is created by the license fees paid by them. There is a wide-spread feeling that the sportsmen's fund has not always been used to best advantage, and that at times its disbursement has been influenced by motives other than the furtherance of the fish and game resources of the state.

It is thought that the state association, which probably will be known as the Oregon Sportsmen's League, will adopt a system which will give to each club in the state belonging to the league, one vote in the affairs of the league, irrespective of the membership of the club or the number of delegates sent by the club to the convention. The purpose of this is to prevent the domination of the affairs of the league by a few of the stronger clubs.

Among the entertainment features proposed for the delegates are a trapshot and fly-casting tournament on the day preceding the convention, and a beefsteak dinner at the close of the convention, followed by motion pictures of special interest to sportsmen.

MUNICIPAL "SOUL-MATING."

NEW YORK, March 5.—Isn't this simple? "The real romance is the right marriage. To love, to be loved, to marry and keep on loving—that is the only perfect and possible ideal for men and women," says Mrs. Mary Austin, who continued, "Mate Love is the only basis for happy marriage, and can be recognized by three high signs. Milligan, State Superintendent of the Anti-Cigarette League of New York, declares: "I have no actual figures on the number of women smokers in New York, but it is appalling.
