Play Here.—The Coquille basketball team will play in Marshfield next Friday night. At Coquille last night, Coquille defeated Myrtle Point 49 to 41.

Boat Damaged.—The U. S. S. Boston, which was on Coos Bay for a time as a training ship for the naval militia, sustained \$2000 damage by being rammed by the Yucatan at Portland, where she is now located.

Mill Closed.—Owing to a cylinder head blowing out at the C. A. Smith power plant this morning, the big mill and smaller plants there were closed down most of the day but it is expected that operations will be resumed in the morning.

First Teams Through.—A drove of eighteen horses arrived in Marshfield last evening from Roseburg, to commence work on the railroad to Coos Bay for Houser & Houser. The roads are pronounced almost impassable as yet by the teamsters who brought the stock here.

Is Re-appointed.—J. M. Thomas, of North Bend, today received his re-appointment under the new State Game Warden, C. H. Evans, for Coos County. He will at once take out the Hungarian pheasants which arrived on the Breakwater today. He is also looking up two or three reported violations of the game law during the interval that he was out of office.

Try Case.—The case of Mrs. Murphy and Robert Marsden, involving the lot at the southwest corner of Golden and Second street is being tried before Judge Coke today. Mrs. Murphy claims that she only intended to mortgage the lot for \$2000, whereas Marsden claims she sold it to him. C. I. Reigard is also involved in it through an option on the property.

Wed in Coquille.—Word has been received here of the marriage of Miss Lois Powell, who formerly sang at the Royal Theater here and who has recently been singing at the Orpheum in Bandon, and Leverage Tower, one of the proprietors of the Orpheum there, at Coquille yesterday. The wedding was a general surprise. Mr. Tower is well known here, being known as "Stub."

Start Suit.—John Hill, a logger formerly employed in the Smith-Powers camps, filed suit yesterday against the company for \$10,000 for injuries which he alleges he sustained while working in the camps on March 4, 1912. Hill alleges that the injuries he sustained left him without the use of his left shoulder. He is in Portland at present and the suit was filed by Selitz and Clark of Portland, through attorneys Hoy and Miller at Marshfield.

Studebaker Car Arrives.—A handsome new Studebaker Four touring car arrived on the Breakwater today for Geo. Goodrum. Being the first of the kind seen on Coos Bay it created considerable interest among auto owners. There was much favorable comment on the handsome appearance of the car.
