Quinn has promised to leave town several times so as to assist him he was ordered detained at the city jail until the departure of one of the boats for the logging camps. He now owes Chief Carter \$15 for back fines.

## W W LEADERS SENT TO JAIL

NEW YORK, March 6.—Joseph Albers and William Greene, members of Frank Tannenbaum's Industrial Workers' army which stormed the New York churches, were sentenced in police court to serve thirty days in jail. They were convicted of disorderly conduct and breach of the peace. Nearly two hundred other cases remained to be disposed of. Tannenbaum was released under \$7,500 bail for further hearing this afternoon.

Manager Kern Says L. J. Simpson Has Not Taken Over Box Factory.  
It was reported in North Bend that L. J. Simpson had closed a deal at San Francisco whereby he would take over the box factory and continue the business. The lease of F. W. Kern on the property, which was bought by the Southern Pacific, will expire in about eight months and it was Mr. Simpson's plan to get a longer lease or to move it onto his own property. Concerning the deal, Manager Kern, of North Bend, today made the following statement: "The report that the box factory at North Bend has been leased to Mr. Simpson is a mistake. Nothing definite has come of the negotiations started several months ago."
