HEAVYWEIGHT BATTLE JUNE 24.

Jack Johnson and Frank Moran to Meet in Paris.

PARIS, March 6.—The date for the fight for the world's heavyweight championship between Jack Johnson and Frank Moran, of Pittsburg, was set for June 27. The velodrome d'Hiver, which has a seating capacity of 35,000, was chosen as the place for the contest. All details have been arranged, except as to choosing the referee. The date for the contest coincides with that of the grand prix, the blue ribbon turf event in France.

SPORT GOSSIP.

NEW YORK, March 6.—With the Giants at Marlin and the Yankees at Houston, an interesting part of Gotham's population has been transferred to Texas. The players are hoping for good weather during the training season, because many of them are anxious to put in all the time in hard work. The early arrivals of the Giants were greeted with a snowstorm and water deep enough to launch a boat, according to reports received by friends in this city.

Jim Delehanty, former Detroit second baseman, and last season with the Minneapolis American Association team, has signed with the Federal League. He expects to play with the Buffalo team. Delehanty lives in Cleveland.

Gradually the dope of the 1914 Three-I schedule leaks out. With the adoption of the schedule it was announced that the season would begin at Peoria April 23. Dan O'Leary's Blue Sox will oppose the Distillers on that date.

Pitcher George Suggs, recently banished to Siberia from Cincinnati, is to be married this month and will spend his honeymoon at the Cardinal's training camp. Could anything be more blissful?

John H. Wagner the thanwhomer shortstop, sometimes called Honus, this year rounds out a full century of continuous service with the Pirates. Although obliged to give up basketball this winter owing to the injury to his knee which he sustained last summer, he is down to weight and is ready to do battle with all phenoms who are after his job.

Plans for the new Federal League grandstand at Indianapolis have been approved by the building inspector there and a permit for the work, which will cost about \$50,000, has been issued. The stand will be of heavy timber construction.

Billy Nixon, the Cambridge, Mass., lightweight, is seeking honors in the political arena. He is a candidate for the nomination of Alderman-at-Large. His first political speech is declared to have been a hit.

The makeup of the Federal League as seems permanently agreed upon is Brooklyn, Buffalo, Pittsburg and Baltimore in the east and Chicago, St. Louis and Kansas City in the West. The schedule meeting of the Feds will be held in Buffalo next week.

Eddie Cicotte, of knuckle-ball fame, and last year star of the White Sox pitching corps, has gone to Paso Robles, Cal., but he will not sign a contract until Comiskey returns from abroad. In the meantime it is reported that the Feds are trying to flirt with Eddie.

A movement against patronizing the cubs has been launched at Chicago by followers of baseball, who have been aroused by the discharge of Johnny Evers. More than 150 members and employes of the Board of Trade signed a petition to confine their support of "our national game to the American and Federal League Parks."

Charley Carr's baseball school received a knock or a boost, as you see fit to call it, by the announcement that Bill Doyle, Nap scout, would open a free baseball school at Portsmouth, Ohio, April 1. He charges nothing for tuition, but reserves the right to get the money minor league clubs get for his candidates who make good.

Bob Fitzsimmons has decided that it is more profitable to do a vaudeville turn than it is to give benefit performances for himself by appearing in boxing bouts with inferior fighters. Therefore he has entered a contract for twelve weeks on the circuit.

Chick Fraser, who a few years ago pitched for every team in the United States, will be back again this season throwing his feet under the table at big league hotels. Chick will coach Pittsburg's young twirlers.

The McFarland-Gibbons fight has joined the Finnigan class. First it was on for March 9th, then it is off for March 9th, and now, in all probability, it will be on again—not for March 9th, however. Billy Gibson wants it distinctly understood though that he is the man to be considered when news of the fight or arrangements for it are under discussion, as he expects to deliver all of the goods, except the actual blows, which will be left to Packey and Mike. The fight may take place later in March or early in April.

BERRY GROWERS ORGANIZE

State-Wide Association to Meet at Salem March 14 to Complete Plan. CORVALLIS, March 6.—The loganberry growers of Oregon will hold a big meeting at Salem on Saturday, March 14. The meeting will be called to order in the Commercial Club rooms at 1:30 p. m. The committee appointed a few weeks ago to draw up a tentative constitution and recommend the by-laws and rules for the transaction of business will make its report at that time and the permanent organization will be perfected.

"It is the idea to form a state-wide association," said Professor C. I. Lewis, the college horticulturist who is working hand in hand with the practical growers. "The great function of the association will be to standardize the products so that not only the fresh fruit but every bit of dried fruit, berry juice, canned berries and berry jams and jells that are shipped out of the state, will be of so high standard as to maintain and increase the present demand.

"It is also necessary to establish a bureau of statistics, which will secure all information possible as to acreage, yields, and present conditions of market, and assist in advertising and distributing the loganberry crop of the state through the channels that are already established. In short, we wish to avoid the mistakes that have been made in other fruit industries.

"It is expected that there will be a very large attendance from all parts of the state."

STEALING PLATE GLASS.

NEW YORK, March 6.—Stealing a red-hot stove is no longer the record crime. A crash of glass aroused Policeman Leahy and sent him sprinting toward a saloon, from which the same crash sent two men sprinting away. The big plate glass window was the burglars' loot, and they might have gotten away with it, if it hadn't broken.
