This camp will be headquarters for the work during the coming summer. Work on the other camps is also progressing.

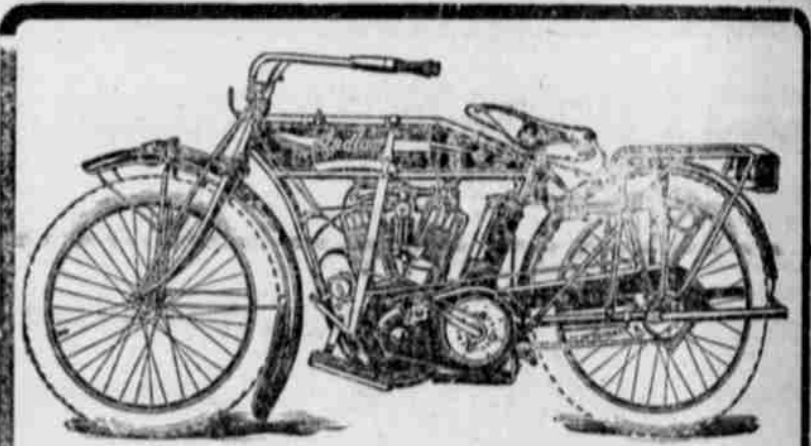
