## FIRST FORD IS BUILT IN ORE.

New Ford Factory is Inaugurated in Portland by the Mayor

The following from The Oregonian will be of interest to the many Ford owners in Coos County. Mr. Goodrum, the local representative of the Ford Company, states that if persons going to Portland will call on him he will issue a card that will take them through the Ford factory and they will find it a sight well worth seeing.

The following is The Oregonian article:

"In the presence of Mayor Albee and all members of the City Commission, the City Engineer and the heads of every business organization in Portland, the first car was assembled yesterday morning at the new Ford factory, Eleventh and Division streets, in just a shade over forty minutes. Visitors were taken on a tour of inspection by E. B. Norman, the manager, who outlined in a few words the capacity and the policies of the factory, after speeches of welcome and congratulation had been offered.

At 11 o'clock all the guests were taken down stairs. The enormous piles of material and parts prompted on all hands the question, "How much stock is kept here?"

The answer was that there is over \$1,200,000 worth of material stored.

On one side were tires, to the right body casings, still further on the fenders, the brakes and the thousand and one parts, all stacked up in surprising numbers.

**Eight Men Build Car.**

Then eight workmen began to assemble the first car. That was at 11:11 o'clock. From a heap of rear axles the first pair was taken. A minute or so and there was the skeleton of a chassis. Each workman strove to have his work finished properly before the others, yet without hurrying over any particular point.

On an overhead pulley, the engine and transmission was dropped to its exact position. Three men fixed it on, while one specialist attended to the wheels.

Then with one motion the front end of the chassis was dropped, the rear end was raised onto small rollers and the car was rushed over to the elevator and so to the second floor. Here the steering wheel, the gas tank, magneto, etc., were affixed and in an incredible space of time the car, minus, of course, its body and its hood, though otherwise complete, was started on the special testing machine and then run off. Fenders, hood, body, top and curtains then were attached and in less than 41 minutes the car was complete.

Manager Norman outlined the possibilities of the plant. The capacity is 25 cars a day. At present the output will be ten cars a day, or 3500 this year. What he earnestly hoped for, he said, was a reduction in freight rates so that more territory could be added to his jurisdiction. At present 132 men are employed. The guests left much impressed."

It is not believed the elections were postponed, as only Congress has the power to do that, and no word has come of any such action. Nothing new was received today regarding the revolution.

## FARMERS PLAN TO OPEN STORE

Expect to Finish Raising Funds for Market Place and Store Soon

At a meeting of the Farmers' Union here Saturday, it was decided to try and close up the stock subscriptions at the next meeting to be held March 21 to raise funds for starting a co-operative store here. It is expected that about \$5000 will be raised.

It is proposed to put in a big general store which will secure all supplies for the ranchers at a minimum cost and also to provide a place where the produce, fruits, vegetables, etc., can be sold direct to the consumers.

## NEWS OF NEARBY TOWNS

### CULLINGS OF COQUILLE.

Coos County Seat News As Told by the Sentinel.

Assessor Thrift will personally assess Bandon, Myrtle Point and Coquille, A. P. Miller the upper Coquille, A. B. Collier the southwestern part of the county and G. A. Gould North Coos River.

O. J. Seelye has formally announced himself as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for county commissioner.

It is a rather anomalous condition that Coquille should be without a representative on the county board; but if we don't land a Coquille man there this fall it will not be for lack of candidates.

A new room has been fitted up at the west end of the basement of the court house for the reception of females charged with criminal offenses or held as witnesses. There is also a room there for insane females.

Five cases of insanity have been brought to the attention of the officials here and passed upon during the past week. Matilda A. Bach of Marshfield was left in the care of her relatives and was taken to the hospital at Salem by them. Samuel L. Vance of Lampa was also left in the care of relatives until he joined the party which was taken out to Salem by way of Myrtle Point and Roseburg in charge of attendants who came from the asylum for them. The other three were Stephen S. Little of Bandon, and William McClintock and Henry Thomas of Coquille.

### LAIRD WON'T RUN.

Geo. P. Laird, of this city, who had contemplated entering the race for the nomination for County Commissioner before the Republican primaries, May 15th, has decided not to run, as some business complications have come up since which he must look after, and consequently will not have time to devote to his campaign. —Bandon Recorder.

### CURRY BRIDGE TROUBLE.

Government May Stop Proposed Chetco Structure.

The Gold Beach Globe says: The concrete bridge has received a blow, according to rumors that are going the round, that will probably be the end of the bridge question at the present time at least. While this rumor may be without foundation it came to us upon good authority that the U. S. Engineer refused to grant a permit for a solid bridge at the place designated, holding that the Chetco at that place was navigable and nothing but a drawbridge could be permitted. The rumor also says that friends of the bridge have got busy with the engineer in an effort to get him down here to look the situation over and reconsider his first statement.

### COUNTY BUSY WITH ROAD WORK.

At the meeting of the county court on Wednesday they ordered the survey of a wagon road from W. R. Cooper's at Bridge to near Dora on the North Fork.

The county clerk was ordered to advertise for bids for a fill at China Camp Creek; also for clearing the rest of the Sumner-Fairview road to the Coos Bay Wagon road.

The county roadmaster was instructed to prepare plans for rebuilding the Charles Collier bridge southeast of this city; also to prepare cross section and plans for grading the road from Empire to North Bend; also to prepare plans for clearing the road from Shingle House slough to the Wm. Ross place; also to prepare plans for grading the road from Summit to the Kruse place.—Coquille Sentinel.

Gourley & Sanders, who have a line of meat markets in several towns of the county, closed the doors of their shop here the first of the week. This leaves Frank Davis, who opened a shop here about three months ago, alone in the field.

### BANDON WATERWORKS.

Proposition to Buy It To Be Voted On July 17.

The Bandon World says: The voters of Bandon will have an opportunity to declare themselves on the water question. At the meeting of the City Council an initiative petition, properly executed, was read by Recorder Kausrud and favorably passed upon. It respectfully demands that a proposed ordinance shall be submitted to the legal voters for their approval or rejection at the regular city election to be held June 17.

The title of the ordinance is as follows: "An ordinance of the City of Bandon providing for the purchase of the Bandon Water company for the sum of \$48,500, authorizing and providing for the issuance of Water Bonds of the City of Bandon in the sum of \$48,500."

### BANDON BOX FACTORY.

George Geisendorfer, who returned from San Francisco after a two weeks' business visit, has launched a manufacturing enterprise in Bandon. He has taken possession of the old ship building plant on Fillmore avenue near the Moore mill and remodelled it into a box factory, which commenced operations this morning.

While at San Francisco Mr. Geisendorfer booked orders that will warrant a full season's run and he declares that he will have no difficulty in keeping the machinery running full blast all the time.—Bandon World.

### ROGUE FISH LAW

SALEM, Or., March 8.—The Attorney General has advised Fish Commissioner Clanton the law prohibiting fishing in certain portions of the Rogue River; does not apply to the state, which can catch fish for the purpose of propagation at any time and any place. The opinion is also that the closed season does not apply to the state fishing for hatchery purposes.

### FUNERAL OF VANDERBILT.

New York Financier to Be Buried on Staten Island Estate.
