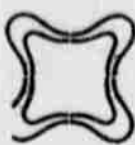

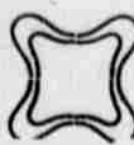

CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR
COMING TO COOS BAY



R. L. STEVENS

former Sheriff of Multnomah Coun-
ty, who has entered the race for
the Republican nomination for Gov-
ernor. Mr. Stevens will visit Coos
Bay soon. He served three terms
as Sheriff of Multnomah, being re-
elected each time by largely in-
creased majorities. He was formerly in
the banking business.

CANDIDATES for county offices
are becoming more numerous
as primary election approaches
and there promises to be something
of a scramble for the political plum
before the final day of filing ar-
rives.

The office of County Commis-
sioner has developed the most ap-
prants to date with County Judge in
second place.

For Commissioner there are al-
ready three candidate from Coos
Bay, namely, E. B. Curtis, of North
Bend, and Thomas B. James and
Levi Smith of Marshfield. On the
Valley side, Mr. Armstrong, the
present Commissioner and Elbert
Dyer, both of Bandon, will seek the
nomination and G. W. Starr, of
Bridge, is also an avowed candi-
date.

Jas. Watson, the well-known and
popular County Clerk, will be a Re-
publican candidate to succeed Judge
as County Judge as is also
J. J. Stanley, Democrat, of Coquille.
Ex-State Senator W. C. Chase, of
Coquille, is another Republican
candidate for County Judge.

James Watson's brother, A. R.
Watson, present Deputy County
Clerk, has filed as a candidate to
succeed his brother.

The primary election is to be
held on May 15, and to become a
candidate upon the official ballot
the would-be office holder must
have his nominating petition filed
with the Clerk on or before April
14. This petition must be signed
by three per cent of the voters, and
the petitions must represent one-
fourth of the voting precincts of
the county.

Thomas B. James, a well-known
and popular Marshfield man, has
announced his candidacy for County
Commissioner on the Republican

North Bend for a number of year
and temporarily removed from Coos
Bay but later returned to locate
permanently and took up his re-
sidence in Marshfield. He is amply
qualified to fill the position and as
he is in the race at the solicitation
of his friends, says he is in to win.
He says he has numerous assur-
ances of support, both from Marsh-
field and North Bend, as well as
from many friends in the Coquille
Valley.
