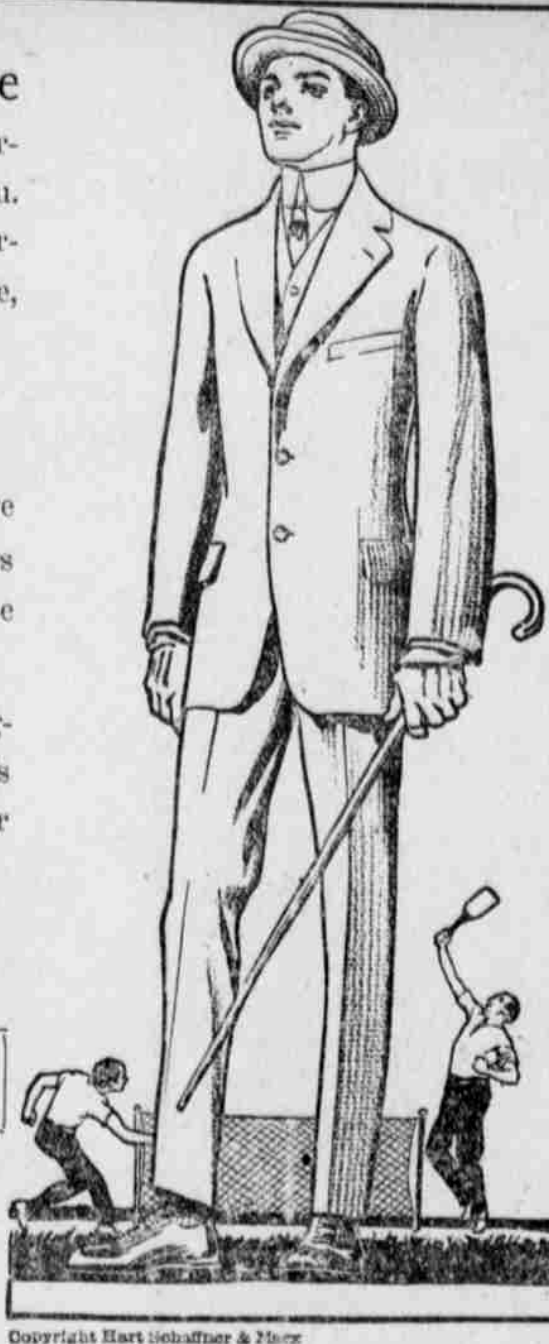

Sails Today.—The Adeline Smith sailed at 12:45 this morning for Bay Point, being in port less than twenty-four hours.

Recovers Bicycle.—Ned Patterson, The Times carrier in West Marshfield, last night found his bicycle which was taken a couple of days ago from the Central school building. It was hidden behind a log.

Farrin Will Run.—Geo. N. Farrin today sent his nominating petitions to Hugh Sneddon to be circulated here. Farrin now lives at Portland and will seek the Republican nomination for Attorney General.

Plans Apartments.—E. B. Curtis of North Bend is figuring on erecting a two-story apartment house on his Bunker Hill property at once. It will be about 30x36 and cost about \$2500. He has been offered \$35 per month rent.

Gets contract.—Chas. Aiken, son of A. G. Aiken, writes that he has returned from San Francisco to Smith River, Calif., to resume his position with a cannery there. While in San Francisco his cannery company landed a contract to furnish salmon for the dining car service.

Greek Troubles.—Just Demos has announced that he will appeal the case wherein Tom Brown and Philip Anest got a judgment for about \$250 against him in Justice Pennock's court in the squabble over the Grand Restaurant in North Bend. Anest has also begun an action in Justice Pennock's court to oust Demos from the building, Anest having a lease on it.

North Bend Road.—P. M. Hall-Lewis is here today from Coquille on business. Mr. Hall-Lewis says that through a plan advanced by Commissioner Armstrong, they now hope to be able to complete the new road from North Bend to Empire, building all within the city limits as well as the rest of it. With the \$18,000 special tax and about \$2300 left over from last year and about \$16,000 regular road tax, and no unexpected work to come up, they will have about \$30,000 for the two miles of hard surfaced road proposed.

Make Extra Cost.—Some of the property owners in the district to be filled by the dredge Seattle who have been "holding out" against signing up for the fill, are to be subjected to the special health law enforcement by Dr. Straw, city physician. Dr. Straw takes the view that lots left unfilled will be a menace to the public health and he will order them filled, the same as he did on South Broadway, near the Williams building. In these cases the lots will not only have to pay for the fill but will also have to pay for the cost of the special bulkhead.
