HOT FINISH IN BASKET BALL

Contest Awarded to Marshfield Last Night as a Result of Clash Over Score

William Hayward, director in athletics at the University of Oregon, arrived in Marshfield via Drayn today. While here Mr. Hayward will deliver a lecture to the high school students of Marshfield, North Bend and the Coquille Valley on athletics. He is one of the best known trainers on the Coast. Former Oregon men and others interested in athletics will probably tender him a little banquet during his stay here.

The last basketball game of the season, played at North Bend Friday evening between Marshfield and North Bend, was awarded by default to Marshfield, with a score of 2 to 0, after a long and heated argument.

During the game Referee Barker awarded Marshfield one point for a foul committed on a Marshfield player while attempting a basket. On account of the noise made by the crowd the scorers did not hear the decision and so failed to score the point. Before announcing the official score Referee Barker hunted up the scorers and ascertained that they had not scored the awarded point for Marshfield. Without this point the score held by the scorers was 17 to 13 in favor of North Bend, but the referee's announcement that they were to count the point awarded to Marshfield made it a tie. According to Spaulding's official basketball rule book, in case of a tie the game is to be continued until one side scores, that team winning the game. The referee announced that the two captains had five minutes to get their men on the field of play, at the end of which time, North Bend not being willing to play off the tie, he awarded the game to Marshfield.

Taken as a whole the game was generally considered the fastest and best ever played in the county. North Bend started off with a rush but was soon caught by Marshfield. The latter remained in the lead until the last two minutes of play, when the foul throwing of Bowen placed North Bend ahead. The line-up of the teams was as follows:
