High School NOTES

HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

Mr. Hayward, physical director at the University of Oregon, will spend this week in Coos County. While here he will address the high school students and it is hoped he may give a stereopticon lecture at the high school building. A committee of four boys representing the four classes, Sydney Clarke, of the Senior class; Wm. McDonald, of the Junior; Henry Lecocq, of the Sophomores and Wesley Seaman of the Freshmen, have been appointed to arrange for his entertainment while here.

NOTED TRAINER TO TALK HERE

"Bill" Hayward, of Oregon University to Speak at High Schools

Trainer "Bill" Hayward of the University of Oregon, arrived Saturday for a series of lectures to be given before the students of the high schools of the county, the first of which will be given in North Bend this evening. On Friday evening he speaks in Marshfield.

Mr. Hayward has to return on the next Breakwater next Saturday and so his schedule has been somewhat changed. He plans to be in Myrtle Point tomorrow, in Bandon Wednesday and in Coquille Thursday, making Marshfield Friday instead of Tuesday as originally planned.

Mr. Hayward has such a statewide and national reputation as an athletic trainer that it is considered a rare treat to get him into this county. His lectures will be upon physical education, taken not only from the athletic standpoint, but also the physical development. He has with him stereopticon and moving picture machines, with which he illustrates his talks.

Besides his lectures his trip has been so arranged that he will be able to spend a day in each city, giving his time in personal talks to individuals interested, and also help some aspiring youth in his chosen line of athletics.

This trip of Mr. Hayward's has been long expected and old college students from U. of O., as well as of other colleges, who have known him or heard of him will be glad to renew their acquaintance, and those who will meet him for the first time will come to realize that the acquaintance of a man of his character and ability goes far toward making college life, as well as life out of college pleasant and useful.

KNOWS WHERE NOTED WRECK IS BURIED
