Sails Today—The Adeline Smith sailed at 4 o'clock this morning for Bay Point.

Eastside Services—Rev. F. W. Davis, the lumberjacks' sky pilot, will hold services in the chapel in Eastside this evening.

Start Club House—Work was commenced on the new social club building for the M. E. Brotherhood. The building is adjoining the M. E. Church in West Marshfield.

Season Closes—The season for catching steelheads here closes Friday morning at 6 o'clock and the next open season for the big fish will be July 16, when the Chinook season opens.

Buys Property—E. M. Smith, of Flagstaff, has bought the Ahlquist property at Bunker Hill, which is next to the Bunker Hill school house. It consists of two houses and two lots. The purchase price was \$1700.

Use Old Engine—Capt. Peter Olson plans to use the old engines of the Wilhelmina, which was wrecked at Florence a few years ago, in the new coasting launch which he is having built at the Kruse & Banks shipyards.

Wed Here—Miss Edith Anderson and Robert Watts were married by Justice C. L. Pennock on Tuesday. Miss Anderson is one of the popular members of the younger set at Eastside and gave her age as 21. Mr.

Watts is employed in the electrical department of the C. A. Smith mill and gave his age as 24.

Injures Head—Fred Frinols, of Bunker Hill, last night while returning from North Bend where he is now employed as sawyer, jumped out of an auto to get his hat that blew off. He stumbled and fell, his head striking his dinner pail and cutting a bad gash.

Mistaken Report—Constable Cox has found that the report turned in to the police department yesterday about trouble around the Simpson home at Bunker Hill is untrue. Mrs. Simpson was at Coquille yesterday and there was no trouble in that section. He has not been able to find out who turned in the report.

Work on Railway—The Eugene Register says: "R. C. Schulze, who has charge of employing men for Porter Brothers, railroad contractors on the Eugene-Coos Bay railroad, arrived in Eugene. He came in over the line all the way from Marshfield. He predicts great activity along the line in a very short time."

Coming Here—The Eugene Guard says "Alexander Martin, III, of Eugene, better known as "Jerry," will leave tomorrow for Marshfield where he has accepted a position with the Oregon Power Company of that place. He has been with the Booth-Kelly Company at Wendling since his graduation from the U. of O. last June."

Many Attend Dance—A large crowd attended the dance given by the Steam Shovelmen at Eckhoff Hall on Tuesday evening. The music furnished by the Twin City Orchestra was in harmony with the event and an enjoyable evening was passed by the merry dancers. The program was of a striking design and prepared especially for the occasion.

Is Named—J. B. Sneddon, secretary of the Marshfield Aerie of Eagles, has made application to be appointed administrator of the estate of G. Catilda, the suicide, who was found dead in the Baines block. Catilda had some money and effects here and someone was needed to look after them. His body will be sent to Eureka, where relatives live, on the next Alliance.

One Arrested—A. M. Morten was arrested by Officer Shoupe at 2:30 a. m., this morning and charged with vagrancy. The man was partly drunk, but his drunkenness would not entitle him to be arrested under that charge, so the latter charge was placed against him. He had no money. His case was dismissed by City Recorder Butler today promising that he would go to work.

Want Court—It is likely that Ten Mile will get a justice of the peace and constable as soon as a district can be formed, and in the meantime a deputy sheriff may be named among the residents of that section. Since the influx of railroad laborers, there has been more or less trouble threatened and a few robberies reported. Severson and others have taken the matter up with District Attorney Liljequist.

Boy Sees Town—Ben Stone, a youth of 12, journeyed on the Sunrise from Catching Inlet to Marshfield today intending to look the town over. When Captain Masters arrived at the landing he queried the youth when he was going to look the town over. "It's too big a place for me," said the boy. "Some day when I have a week off I will come down and see the town right."

Gets Layoff—Capt. Erickson, of the Redondo, was given a thirty-day suspension by the U. S. Inspectors at San Francisco for the recent collision of the Redondo and

the Sam Jacinto there. The accident occurred in a heavy fog and the inspectors held Erickson liable. In the meantime, Capt. Rees is master of the Redondo and Capt. Erickson is completing his new home at Berkeley.

On Other Car—Chas. Bonebrake states that Joe Dodge who was fined yesterday for speeding an auto, was driving one of D. L. Foote's autos instead of Mr. Bonebrake's car as was first reported.

Out to Homesteads—Jack and George Flanagan and Will Dungan left this morning for above Myrtle Point, where they will remain for a time making improvements on their homestead claims in that section.

Fine Social—Miss Anne Wiekman, teacher at the Millington school, gave a social last Saturday evening at the Millington Hall whereby \$50 was raised for the benefit of the library. A basket supper followed dancing and social games. One of the contests was the guessing as to the identity of advertisements, the illustrations being simply cut out and numbered. Many guessed from fourteen to nineteen of the twenty advertisements.

Empire Won—Parties from Empire report that the picked town team took the dredge Michie team down the line six to five Sunday, although Tamp Osborn, who created such a tuction in Bandon baseball last year, did the twirling for the sailors. This was the first out of three games that Empire won and Ingham, of Empire, is given credit for being too good a twirler for the Michie nine. The Michie nine may play a pickup team in North Bend next Sunday.

Completes Assessment—C. H. Dungan was in Marshfield today on his return from Coquille, where he made returns on his assessment district, comprising Catching Inlet, Ross Inlet and South Coos River. Mr. Dungan was among the first of the deputy assessors to complete the work. He reports a fair increase of assessed valuation in his district but considerable complaint at the constantly increasing taxes. He said that this is going to have a bad effect on the good roads bond issue as there is a general feeling among ranchers that taxes are already too high.
