## CONGRESSMAN HAWLEY WRITES ABOUT COOS BAY BAR WORK

Coos Bay Must Get Busy and Have Engineers Recommend Jetty

FAVORABLE REPORT ON JETTY ALONE WILL DO Survey of Harbor and Bar Presents Opportunity For Action

Coos Bay must get busy and to it that the U. S. Engineers recommend the reconstruction of the jetty is the statement of Congressman Hawley in a letter to Senator Smith. Hawley's letter is of vital importance here now since Capt. Macgenn and other bar authorities claim that dredge Michie has demonstrated that the reconstruction of the jetty is the only means of improving the harbor. Hawley's letter is as follows: "I thank you very much for the report you make relative to the local situation in your section. Do not think any person who maintains that anything more should have been done to date for improvement of Coos Bay than has been done in the past few years, may think they could have done more, or make glowing promises when any one fully understands the situation. I think it would be agreed that all has been done that could be done, and the interest of Coos Bay have never for instant been made to take a step. If the Board of Engineers for Harbors and Rivers had recommended an extension and reconstruction of the jetty, I could be secured upon such recommendation for the appropriation of the money to do the work. There is soon to be made a survey to see if the jetty should be extended and reconstructed. I suggest that the people of Coos Bay so prepare the case for its improvement that the engineer will recommend reconstruction and extension of the jetty alone—which we all depend upon that I think we have no difficulty in getting necessary appropriations. I always urged that the jetty was the proper way to improve the bar and waterway, and who have been associated with me in the fight for Coos Bay." ## INDIANA TO HAVE PRIMARY

State Democratic Convention Adopts Oregon System in Platform

SHIVELY IS NOMINATED. INDIANAPOLIS, March 19.—A high tribute was paid to the national administration of Wilson, Marshall and Bryan in the platform adopted by Democratic State Convention. Such a fulfillment of party pledges in the first year is without a parallel in the history of the country, the document says. Senator Shively was renominated.

INDIANAPOLIS, March 19.—Candidates for every state office except Governor will be named by the State Democratic Convention, which met here today. The United States senatorial candidate will also be named. After an all-night session the Resolutions Committee adopted a platform for the consideration of the convention which includes a plank favoring a state-wide primary law.

Lauds Democrats. Governor Ralston, addressing the convention, declared for an emphatic support of President Wilson's Mexican policy. He said: "President Wilson has handled with great wisdom and dignity a critical Mexican situation. Christian people without regard to party endorse his course and pray it may result in victory for law and justice. Much of the popularity of the administration is due to the stand it has taken for things which have been advocated for years under the leadership of that masterful man, William Jennings Bryan."

## FOURTH VICTIM OF AEROPLANE

Lieut. Treeby, of English Army, Killed Today—Many Fatalities

SALISBURY, England, March 19.—Lieutenant Treeby was killed when his biplane side-slipped. He was the fourth officer killed here in two weeks.

## SEC. REDFIELD SCORED TODAY

Representative Humphreys Says Shingle Mill Report is Partisan

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 19.—Secretary Redfield's report on the prosperity of shingle mills of the Northwest was attacked by Representative Humphrey, of Washington, as based on evidence obtained from a partisan investigation. Humphrey recently charged that the mills were injured by the new tariff. Redfield's report was a refutation of that.

## NO LAWYERS ALLOWED LAND HEARING TODAY

A rather unique hearing was held here today by Land Commissioner Arthur K. Peck. It was to take the evidence of John B. Anderson and Harry Stimmel in the contest of the United States vs. Henry Harris. Harris entered a homestead in Section 25, South Slough and the government holds that it is coal land. In the instructions governing the hearing, the land office officials instructed Commissioner Peck not to allow any attorneys, either for the Government or for Harris, to be present while Anderson or Stimmel testified.

## COSTLY FIRE IN MILWAUKEE

Windsor Hotel, Western Newspaper Union and Evening Wisconsin Burned

MILWAUKEE, March 19.—The Windsor Hotel was gutted by fire when the flames spread from the Western Newspaper Union. All the guests escaped. The job department of a newspaper, the Evening Wisconsin, was damaged by smoke and water. The total loss is \$200,000.

## PLAN TO VOTE ON SUFFRAGE

Protests Against Senate Action on Amendment Will be Ignored

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 19.—The United States voted down late today the Ashurst resolution to provide for a constitutional amendment extending suffrage to women.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 19.—Protests against immediate action on the proposed constitutional amendment extending suffrage to women, under debate in the Senate, continued to reach the capital in suffrage letters from throughout the country. The Senators leading the fight for the amendment, however, were prepared for a fight and a vote within a day or two. They are satisfied that while they face almost overwhelming defeat, nothing can be gained by further efforts to delay action.

## MONIS QUILTS CABINET NOW

French Minister of Marine Resigns as Result of Criticism

PARIS, March 19.—Madame Caillaux's assassination of Gaston Calmette has resulted in another change in the French cabinet today, when Ernest Monis, Minister of Marine, resigned. His resignation is the outgrowth of allegations that while he was premier, Monis caused a postponement of the trial of a swindler, who later disappeared on bail.

## PANAMA TOLL DEBATE WARM

Senator Jones, of Washington, Insists on Knowing More Details

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 19.—Discussion of the Panama tolls controversy was renewed in the Senate when Jones of Washington again urged the passage of his resolution asking President Wilson to submit to the Senate the names of all foreign governments which have protested against the tolls exemption provision of the Panama act, together with copies of the communications which have passed between them and the United States on the subject. Jones contended that it was imperative that the Senate, before it undertook to act upon President Wilson's request, should be informed as to the interests of foreign nations in the matter. Administration supporters hold that President Wilson communicated all that he desired to say in his recent message.

## WILSON RAPS JONES TODAY

President Tells Washington Senator That He is "Skating on Thin Ice."

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 19.—President Wilson told Senator Jones of Washington that he was "skating on thin ice" in his speech yesterday and intimated that the President had decided not to read his message to Congress on the tolls question until after Sir Lionel Carden, British minister to Mexico, visited the White House. Senator Jones came to discuss with the President the relations of the pending fisheries bill affecting the salmon industry, but Wilson turned the conversation to the Senator's speech of yesterday. The President told callers afterwards that he could not get suggestions on the Mexican question out of Sir Lionel "with a corkscrew," and that the conference was purely for information on the general situation. Jones returned to the Capitol and gave the Senate the president's unqualified denial. "President Wilson assures me," said Jones, "that there was no basis of fact in the articles I referred to warrant the conclusions with regard to this government and its relations with Great Britain in the matter. I think I was misunderstood in that I did not draw the conclusions myself, but took them from newspaper reports. I think it is only just to President Wilson that I make this statement because I do not want to misrepresent anybody."

Jones said the incident served to illustrate the necessity for more information on tolls exemption, and again urged his resolution calling on President Wilson for information as to what government had protested against the exemptions for American ships. The action was again deferred when Eristow moved it go over until he could confer with members of the canal committee.

## Mexican Dictator Requests For Conference at Vera Cruz Soon

NO DEFINITE NEWS AS TO REAL OBJECT

President Wilson Willing to Listen to Any Proposition From Him

MORE TROOPS TO BORDER. LITTLE ROCK, Ark., March 19.—Four companies of United States Infantry left Fort Logan H. Roots for Laredo, Tex.

CINCINNATI, March 19.—Two battalions of the Ninth United States Infantry will leave Fort Thomas late today for Laredo.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 19.—While no official word has been received of the reported purpose of Huerta to open parleys with the United States by sending his minister of foreign affairs to confer with John Lind at Vera Cruz, administration officials indicated a willingness to listen to any proposals for a peaceful settlement. The impending battle at Torreon is expected to mark a critical turn in the prestige of the contending factions.

ATLANTA, Ga., March 19.—The Seventeenth United States Infantry left Fort McPherson today for Eagle Pass, Texas.

JUAREZ, March 19.—A simultaneous attack on Torreon and Mazatlan is predicted in advices received today. It was said that while Villa's rebel army was moving against Torreon, the forces under General Obregon would assault Mazatlan. Obregon was reported to be moving 12,000 troops against the Pacific coast port. This was said to be a part of a general plan for an aggressive movement against all federal forces in northern Mexico. The fall of Mazatlan, it is considered, would mean virtual control of the West coast district, while Torreon is the railroad center of central Mexico, the capture of which would threaten the capital. After the capture of these two points both armies would move against Guadaluajara, which is the strategic key to the interior. According to the plans, Guaymas would be ignored in the hope that the California Gulf port will fall with the capture of Mazatlan.

The ban on news from the interior below this point remained firm. The reported Federal victories above Torreon proved false.

## IS SAVED FROM ST. LOUIS RUINS

Thomas Burke Rescued After Being Entombed 36 Hours in Debris

ST. LOUIS, March 19.—His call for a drink of water today led to the rescue of Thomas Burke from the ruins of the St. Louis Seed company's building, thirty-seven hours after the structure collapsed under the falling wall of the Missouri Athletic Club, which was destroyed by fire with a loss of thirty lives ten days ago. After the eighty rescuers had worked for a half hour they found Burke with his feet pinioned. Near him was found the body of an unidentified man, bringing the total number of dead found to six. Burke died in the city hospital several hours after being taken from the ruins.
