**The Failure of Government By Good People**

CITIES (and states and nations) are as like as men (and women) and as unlike. People differ in what we call their personalities; in appearance and manner; in age, education, and even in deeper lying traits.  
So with communities. Fundamentally they are all alike. Boston, for example, is essentially as corrupt as Philadelphia or San Francisco, New York, Pittsburg or Chicago.  
In other words, Boston, Mass., U. S. A., is a part of the world. Its condition is our condition, natural, typical, common. What we know of other cities will help us to understand Boston and, as we understand Boston, we shall understand the problem of other cities, other states and other nations. For the problem of Boston is our problem. And, if Boston shall solve it, we all will have solved it. If any city shall solve it, it will be solved. And Boston wants to solve it. Boston is literally dying to solve the social problem, and intends to.  
Boston is paved with good intentions. So is traditional hell. It is said that that pavements stands the fire down there. But that's no test. Will it bear the daily traffic of this earth? That's the question. Will Boston, meaning well, do right?

The distinction of Boston, Mass., among cities lies in this—that Boston is a common city of superior people. Boston has all those good things—education, breeding, wealth, leisure, character, conscience, age and good-will—which other communities think, if they had them, would make impossible political corruption and the evil consequences thereof. And yet Boston has political corruption and the evil consequences thereof. What is more, Boston has always had the essence of these good things, and yet Boston has always had political corruption and the evil consequences—and the causes—thereof.

Goodness in Colonial Boston  
Boston was founded as an experiment in good-will. The conditions were scientifically almost perfect. The place chosen was isolated. The North Atlantic Coast of America in the seventeenth century and the wilderness back of it, were as far removed from the contaminating influences of the wicked world as it would be possible to find upon this earth. The founders were good men and women; their purpose, their passion in life, was to be good; and they were impelled, inspired and sustained by a vision, not merely of good, but of a godly government.

The goodness of the Puritans was narrow, yes; but it was practical. It was rather terrible, but it was real and enduring. And, as for the Puritan stock, the whole country knows that it has spread far and wide over the United States its pure blood and its Puritan traits; the New England conscience, idealism, ideals and ideas. Yankee individualism and Yankee notions of goodness and government prevail among us to this very day.  
Boston's Rule of the Best.  
The ministers ruled Boston in the good old days. They were the bosses. Literally. The big ministers were the Colonial bosses; they steered the governor and the general court, while the little ministers
