HOT WEATHER ON COOS BAY

Thermometer Registered 80
Noon—Previous Hottest
March Day.

84 THIS AFTERNOON.

At 2:30 this afternoon the maximum temperature had increased to 84, according to the Government thermometer.

Several thermometers around town showed higher temperatures, some recording as high as 92.

Today is one of the hottest March days that Coos Bay has ever known. At 12 o'clock the Government thermometer registered 80 in the shade. Yesterday, some thought, was warmer, but the Government thermometer showed that it was four degrees cooler, the maximum temperature being 76.

March 7, 1905, the mercury reached 86, but at no other time on Coos Bay has it ever been close to eighty, according to B. B. Ostland, the local U. S. Weather Observer.

HOT IN SAN FRANCISCO.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 19.—"Hottest day in March since the San Francisco weather bureau was established," said the weather man. The official thermometer registered 80.5 degrees, which is half a degree warmer than the previous record of March 7, 1892. On the streets, some thermometers registered 90 degrees.
