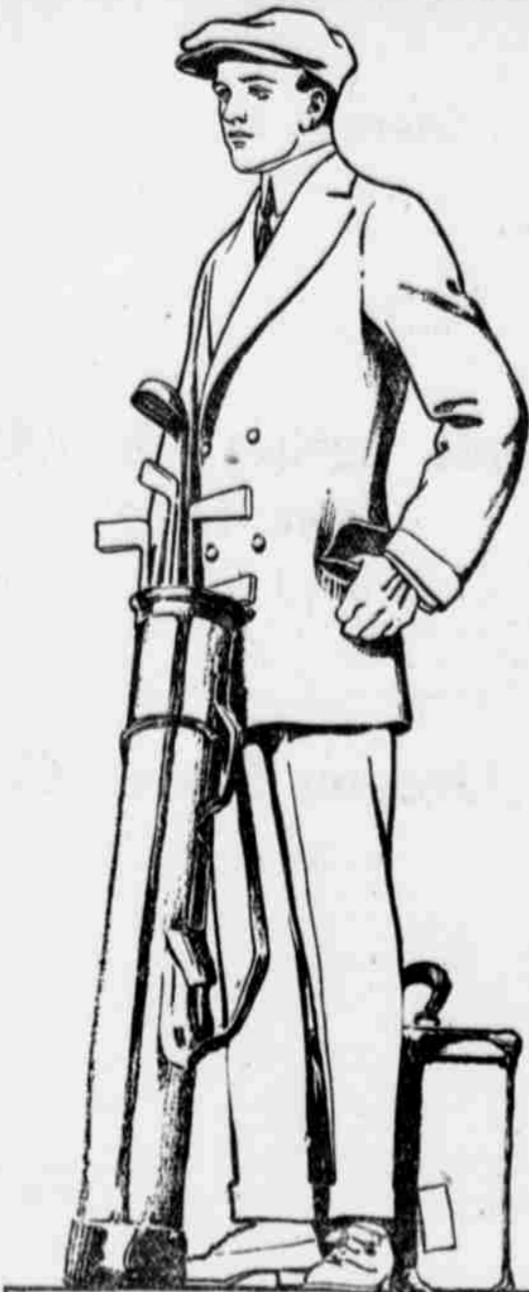

EIGHTY-TWO IN SHADE TODAY

Temperature Did Not Mount as High as Yesterday—Fear Storm

Eighty-two in the shade was the warmest it got today, according to the Government thermometer. This was at 2 o'clock and at 3 o'clock the mercury had receded to seventy-nine. Many thought that it was warmer than yesterday, but the thermometer did not show it.

Parties at North Bend reported that it was 98 in the sun in Old Town at noon.

The thermometer at the corner of Front and Market registered about 86 at 1 o'clock.

L. A. Liljeqvist, who was here from Coquille, stated that 81 was the warmest it got in Coquille yesterday.

Tomorrow and the next day is the equinoctial period and some fear a bad storm may follow the unusual heat.

While the majority like the warm weather, many ranchers and fruit growers are fearful lest it start the buds so that the usual spring frosts will raise havoc with the crops.

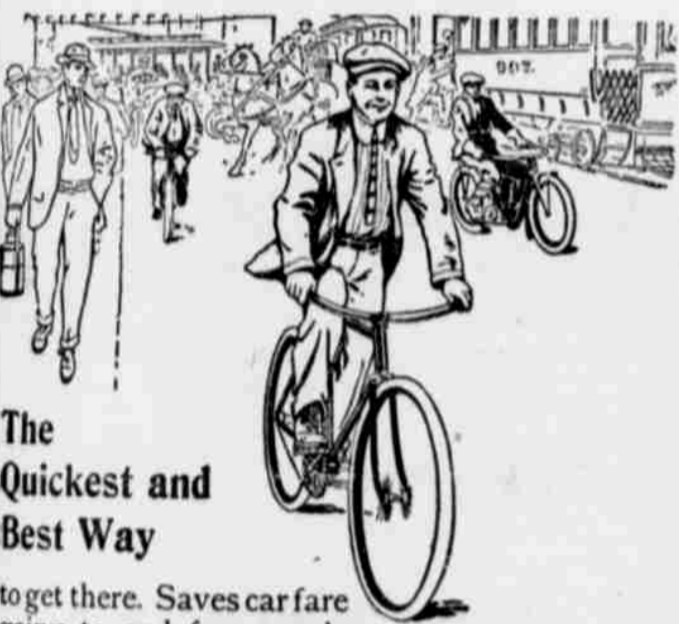
