## WILL APPRAISE KINNEY PROPERTY

G. W. Kaufman, E. M. Ward and J. W. Grout Named by Receiver Watters.

Judge V. E. Watters receiver for the Kinney properties, announced today that he had selected G. W. Kaufman of Marshfield, E. M. Ward and J. W. Grout as the appraisers to fix the values of the various parcels of property upon which sales will be made.

The matter of the selections will come up before Judge Harris at Eugene today upon Judge Watters' petition for their approval. They will be approved unless there is some objection by the defendants and none is expected. Notice of the selection was served on C. A. Schibred, attorney for the Kinney companies, some days ago.

It will take the appraisers some time to go over the property and determine the values of it and after their findings have been announced Major Kinney and his representatives will be given a hearing as to their reasonableness. This was the procedure two years ago when Pat Henessey, J. C. Merchanta and J. P. Morris appraised the property for W. J. Rust as trustee.

### AROLINE OUT ON FIRST TRIP

Steamer Sailed Sunday for San Francisco—North Next Saturday.

Paul Dimmick, general agent of the Swayne-Hoyt people here, expects to conclude arrangements today or tomorrow for establishing an agency in Marshfield and will probably arrange for using the old Breakwater dock here.

The Aroline is scheduled to leave San Francisco early Thursday for Coos Bay and will probably sail from here next Saturday for Portland.

## ALLIANCE IS OVERHAULED

Elder or Homer May Be Assigned to Relieve Regular Vessel. A Portland paper says: Work being done aboard the steamer Alliance, operated by the North Pacific line on the Portland-Coos Bay-Eureka run, precedes a general overhauling which is to be started as soon as the steamer George W. Elder is in commission again or some other vessel is available. The Alliance has been on drydock here and considerable caulking done on her hull, besides cleaning and painting.

As the George W. Elder made Eureka when first placed on the Portland-California route by the North Pacific, it is assumed that she will be assigned to cover the coast route while the Alliance is off, though definite information has not been received. It is said the company has the steamer Homer and she may retire the Alliance, a trouble experienced on the Humboldt Bay bar was responsible for the Elder being withdrawn from there when the business was turned over to the Alliance. The latter was floated from drydock and sailed Sunday night.

Steamer Arrives from Frisco—Machinery for Dungeness Factory.

## BANDON TO BUY BOAT

Parties figure on Arcata and delay for Run. It is reported that negotiations pending between Coquille business men and San Francisco parties for the purchase of a steamer in view of placing it on a Portland run between Bandon and Portland. According to the information of K. Smith of Coos County Collieries who returned on the Elizabeth from Frisco, has brought with him several propositions made by owners of boats in that city.

The first said to have been considered was the Arcata, which was ago came into this port. Its price is given as \$4,000, but it is believed that the inspectors have allowed present boilers only three years' service after which they would have to be replaced.

The latest negotiations and most likely to materialize is the Mandaly, a good sized ship in excellent condition with accommodations for considerable tonnage and 20 passengers. An offer rumored to have been \$35,000, was tendered to the owners by wire this week, but it is believed the original price asked in Frisco was \$40,000.
