Residents of Florence and Vicinity to Secede from Lane.

MAPLETON, Ore., March 23.—Western Lane county has decided to secede and form a new county to be known as Sluslaw. Committees have been appointed to work to that end.

This is the result of the County Division conference held. Practically all of Lane county west of the divide was represented, some 30 odd enthusiastic delegates being present.

The meeting was called to order with R. A. Lowe, Glenada, as temporary chairman; N. Mumme, temporary secretary. Permanent officers and committees were elected as follows: R. S. Huston, chairman, Florence; C. E. Harwood, secretary, Glenada; finance committee, J. W. Bergman, Florence; C. E. Harwood, Glenada; Joe Slemmons, Mapleton; Committee on boundaries, J. W. Ford Florence; Blachly, Blachley; W. H. Weatherston, Florence; R. A. Lowe, Glenada; Horace Fisk, Lake Creek. Committee on campaign and petitions, Hans Peterson, North Fork; Jared Scott, Acme; J. C. Beck, Point Terrace, C. W. Beers, Indian Creek, N. B. Hull, Glenada. Executive committee, Wm. Kyle, Florence; Robt. Clow, Mapleton; W. H. Weatherston, Florence; Chairman Huston and Secretary Harwood.

The final report of the boundaries committee included western Lane county only with the eastern line conforming as nearly as practicable with the Port of Sluslaw lines.
