

SOME INTERESTING CROP STATISTICS

ANGELES COUNTY LEADS UNITED STATES—PENNSYLVANIA COUNTY SECOND, AN ILLINOIS COUNTY THIRD

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 26. — Los Angeles County, California, ranked first in the United States in the production of all the 2,950 counties reported on the census of 1910, according to the report of the Director of the Census, by Director William J. Clegg, of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, Land and Natural Resources, ranked Pennsylvania, ranked second, and Illinois, ranked third. The principal crops of the United States, in the order of their value, were the cereals, corn, wheat, oats, etc., hay and forage and cotton. Some interesting data are presented by the figures for the value per acre and per capita of the crops raised in these eight banner counties of the United States. The figures for Los Angeles County show that the total value of the crops raised there averaged \$35 per acre and \$29 per capita (the city of Los Angeles with a population of 320,000 being within Los Angeles County, is the chief reason for the low rate per capita); for Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, \$28 per acre and \$78 per capita; for McLean County, Illinois, \$18 per acre, and \$188 per capita; Whitman County, Washington, \$14 per acre, and \$377 per capita; Livingston County, Illinois, \$18 per acre and \$281 per capita; Iroquois County, Illinois, \$16 per acre and \$298 per capita; La Salle County, Illinois, \$17 per acre and \$113 per capita, and Aroostook County, Maine, \$23 per acre and \$136 per capita. The corresponding crop value figures (at the farm) for the United States for the same year were \$16 per acre and \$60 per capita.

WILL WORK FOR GOOD ROADS

A. T. MORRISON WILL MAKE HIS CAMPAIGN FOR REPRESENTATIVE ON THIS ISSUE— FAVORS GREATER BOND ISSUE

In a letter to the editor of The Times, A. T. Morrison, of Coquille, writes as follows concerning his candidacy for the Legislature before the Democratic primaries: Editor Times: My purpose in asking the people to send me to the Legislature is to try and get a better system of road laws so that it will be possible to build a better system of roads. One of the worst drawbacks to the settlement of people on our Oregon lands are the miserable conditions of our highways. The people are getting awake to this fact and are willing to build roads, but our road laws can be so improved that we will be able to make better headway. Through our road association I am going to initiate a measure to change the limit of bonded indebtedness from two per cent of the assessed valuation to five per cent. I think that the people of Oregon will gladly vote for this change if the matter is put up to them at the general election this next November. I believe that the people of Coos County would vote a million in bonds quicker than \$440,000. We could then build enough roads to reach enough more people so that there would not be any contention as to where the money would be spent. Very truly, A. T. MORRISON.

RAISING IN THE NORTHWEST

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 26. — The price of pork in the Northwest has been high because of the fact that it has been difficult to ship a large percentage from east of the Rocky Mountains. By providing pasture for hogs in this region and utilizing the hog to harvesters for himself the cost of raising hogs in the Northwest has been materially reduced as to the log industry profitable hogs are a consideration. In a new bulletin of the Department of Agriculture entitled "Raising Hogs in the Pacific Northwest" it is possible to provide several months of the busy season. The crops generally used for this purpose are wheat, field peas, corn and barley. The bulletin gives information in considerable detail regarding suitable pasture crops for the different sections of Washington and Oregon. It also contains a number of illustrations. An easily and cheaply constructed rack for feeding hay to hogs is shown. Farmers interested in developing the hog industry in the Pacific Northwest are advised to write for this new bulletin (No. 68), which can be had free on application to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.
