North Bend High School Honors Champions With Banquet and Program

The spoils attached to victory were received by the North Bend basketball team when they were banqueted by the members of the Alumni at the North Bend High School at the gymnasium on Wednesday evening. The feeling of victors showed itself in the entertainment and remarks of the evening. About twenty members of the Alumni attended and thirty invited guests. The High School Band rendered three numbers, opening the evening entertainment. The band showed by its rendition of last evening that it is fast improving.

Supt. A. G. Raab was called on to make a few remarks on basketball in which he complimented the basketball team for the fine work they had done during the season. Prof. Raab emphasized the fact that the team work of the North Bend boys was one thing that entitled them to all honor. The speaker said that individual glory was not looked for by the members of the team, the game being to "pass the ball to Bowen, and he will do the rest."

Miss Grace Fulton entertained the boys with an interesting reading on basketball which was very well received.

Clarence Watkins rendered a vocal solo, with Miss A. G. Raab at the piano and Earl Brown, obligato. The selection was very well received.

The North Bend High School rooters were there. You could hear them, too. They furnished the next number on the program with a series of yells, under the leadership of Frank Hodson.

Lyle Chappelle, the official scorer for the North Bend team, who attended all games of last year, was then called on for an address. Mr. Chappelle delivered a few remarks on the different games of the season. He said:

"The Brown and Gold opened its basketball season with a series of three exhibition games.

"First was with the Alumni at the gym., December 12, 1913. It was defeated 31 to 24. It was a complete surprise to those who witnessed it, as everyone was looking for the high school to be beaten.

"The second was with Marshfield High School at the Gym., December 17. A point a minute was scored by the Brown and Gold while Marshfield did not do so well, the final score being 40 to 19.

"Two nights later on, Friday, December 19, a return game was played with them at the gym. in Marshfield. The result was: North Bend 23, Marshfield 20.

North Bend, after defeating all the teams of the county once, including Myrtle Point, then went to latter's home and lost by the close score of 16 to 22. This was the greatest joke of the season.

Coquille was last year's champions and had very good prospects this year until she bumped into North Bend and spilled two games straight. Later she was jarred by Marshfield for another game.

"Marshfield had a very weak team at the beginning of the season but towards the latter part came very strong. The second series game that she played with North Bend was claimed a tie. However, North Bend gave them a chance to prove it and defeated them 18 to 8 on their home floor.

"Myrtle Point proved that she had a little class by catching North Bend on an off night.

"Bandon defeated those who defeated the undefeated."

Russel Lafferty, coach of the

North Bend team for the past season and the one who has led them to victory, was the next speaker. Mr. Lafferty complimented the team on the fine showing they had made and the team work that was evident at all times and during every game. He said that team work on the part of the North Bend team was the principal factor in winning the pennants.

Miss Dorothy Kibler, under whose guiding hand the festive board for last evening's entertainment was prepared, made a few remarks on the pleasure of arranging a repast for the victors. Miss Kibler showed by the banquet which she arranged that the victory spirit was in evidence.

The gymnasium was decorated in brown and gold crepe paper, pennants and cedar greens. The pennants were suspended from the corners of the room crossing in the center from which hung a large basketball decorated in brown and gold. Professor Grubb, whose efforts and enthusiasm helps largely to make North Bend the winner, was the genial toastmaster of the evening.

TO WORK FOR HARBOR AIDS

Grants Pass to Send Delegates to Washington to Boost Crescent City

GRANTS PASS, Or., March 24.—The county court in special session, appropriated \$500 to send a representative of Josephine county to Washington, D. C., on April 7, when the board of army engineers will consider the appropriation for the improvement of the Crescent City harbor. A survey has been made of the harbor showing the work necessary to permit the entrance of the largest vessels, and recommending the prosecution of the work. The estimate of the cost is \$1,800,000. The board of engineers has not been satisfied of the need for the improvement, and set April 21 as the date for a hearing and invited interested persons to present evidence supporting the need for the harbor improvement. As the harbor is essential to the full success of the railroad now being built from Grants Pass toward the coast, this city has joined with Crescent City and will present data to the board at the hearing to support the appropriation. Attorney O. S. Blanchard will be sent from here. Crescent City will send four delegates.
