## DOLLAR PLANS FOR FUTURE

### Rumor That He is Figuring on Making Coos Bay Base of Foreign Shipping

According to a rumor prevalent here since the visit of Capt. Robert Dollar of the Dollar Steamship and Lumber company last week, Capt. Dollar is making plans to make Coos Bay a base of operations for his big export lumber business. The report is not given as official but apparently comes from a most reliable source. It is said that Capt. Dollar is figuring a few years ahead and is planning on the early completion of a railroad as far south as Bandon and probably extending further.

No details of his plans are given out, but it is understood that he figures on shipping his lumber here by rail and then loading on the Bay.

### Extend Line South.

In this connection it is pointed out that the Southern Pacific recently furnished the Santa Fe the funds to complete its portion of the San Francisco-Eureka line with a view to having it available for the completion of its new coast line via Coos Bay. The work on the balance of the connecting link between Coos Bay and Eureka hinges somewhat on financial conditions generally but it is said the Southern Pacific officials are planning to make it the first of their new projects and to place it ahead of the Natron cutoff and other work, except the Coos Bay-Eugene line.

### ELKTON WOMAN DEAD.

#### Suspect Crime in Connection with Death of Mrs. Bossen.

SPRINGFIELD, Or., March 27.—The body of Mrs. Edith Bossen, who died suddenly Friday morning, was disinterred and brought to Walker's undertaking rooms here, where Dr. J. Randolph Barr of this place and Dr. W. Kuykendall of Eugene performed a postmortem examination for the purpose of determining the cause of the woman's death. Persistent rumors in the neighborhood where Mrs. Bossen lived, near Springfield junction, caused Prosecuting Attorney Devers to have the examination made.

Mrs. Bossen's mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Levens, came from Elkton upon receiving word of the woman's death, and Mrs. Levens is still here, as is Mrs. Bossen's sister.

Mrs. Bossen, who was 27 years of age, was in usual health Thursday evening but was taken ill about midnight and died before 6 o'clock in the morning, before a doctor could be called.

### BOATS ARE BUSY.

#### Twenty-three Coasters Are Busy in Columbia and Willamette.

Including a few sailing vessels there are twenty-three coasters in the river, the largest number to be assembled here for several months. ### SHINGLE MILL FOR GLENADA.

FLORENCE, Or., March 27.—Work has begun on the new shingle mill to be built in Glenada. This building is being erected on the water front and just west of Harwood's shop. Part of the machinery for the mill is already here, but C. E. Harwood states it will be thirty days before the balance of the machinery arrives. By that time the building will be complete and cutting shingles will begin a week or two later. The plant will have a capacity of 50,000 daily.

### NEWPORT MILL PLAN NOVEL.

#### Lumber Will Be Delivered to Ships by Cable.

NEWPORT, Or., March 27.—Otter Rocks, ten miles north of Newport, will soon have a unique sawmill in operation. B. F. Jones and M. V. Case erected the mill in a place reached only by a trail leading to the Devil's Punch Bowl.

A cable will be stretched from the cliffs at the Punch Bowl to Gull Rock, 400 yards at sea, across deep water. The lumber will be run out on this cable and dropped into the hold of the loading vessel. The machinery for this work will cost \$7000.

### MRS HURD ADMINISTRATRIX.

Mrs. Lilly N. Hurd, of Florence, was appointed administratrix over the estate of O. W. Hurd, deceased. Charles Cox, A. E. Wheeler and Jas. Moore were named as appraisers of the estate, the value of which is unknown. The personal property is estimated at \$1000. The heirs are Lilly M. Hurd, the widow; C. Margaret Hurd, a daughter; L. Roscoe Hurd, a son; and Hester L. Hurd, a daughter.—Eugene Guard.

### FOREST NOTES

The Canadian forestry association, which recently met in Ottawa, has selected Halifax, Nova Scotia, for its next annual meeting place.

The stringent requirement of the forest service that all sheep be dipped before entering the National forests has practically eradicated scabies on those areas.

The lumbermen of Maine in 1900 originated in this country the use of mountain lookout towers with telephone connection for the prompt location and suppression of forest fires.

A California firm is selling eucalyptus charcoal at \$24 a ton, as against \$20 a ton for oak charcoal. Since most of the California-grown eucalyptus do not make good lumber, uses for other products of the tree are being sought.

Fifteen small sawmills are cutting timber from the Powell National forest in Southern Utah, more than 100 miles from the nearest railroad. They are run by settlers during time that can be spared from the crops, and supply local needs since there is no opportunity to ship timber in or out.
