City Salaries - Dr. Straw is to deliver a talk at the Fellowship Club meeting next Tuesday night on "Salaries of City Employees." City Engineer Cavanaugh of Eastside is to be requested to deliver a short talk on the proposed change in the Eastside-Marshfield ferry landing.

Funds to Library - The Civic Improvement Club met Thursday night at the Chamber of Commerce. There was a discussion as to what would be done with the funds left over. It was decided to turn them over to the Library, with the stipulation that the money should be used for binding magazines and for children's books. The amount was \$93.65.

Back from War - Jim Chergos, a Greek, who left here last year with a number of his countrymen to aid his native land in the Balkan struggle, returned yesterday and was warmly welcomed by the Athens contingent in Marshfield. He said a number who had served with him came to Oregon. He told graphically of the struggle and the turmoil following the combined fight against Turkey.

It was one of the best features ever shown here, the films being nearly perfect and the actors who posed for it being of unusual merit. It required nearly two hours to show the several reels but there was not a drag nor delay and the merit of the picture held the audience closely. It is being repeated again today.

Not Informer - John L. Johnson of Eastside says that he did not inform anyone in Oklahoma that Ralph Roberts, alias F. J. Smith, was on Coos Bay. He said that the first he knew about the arrest was the other day when Sheriff Gage telephoned him and asked about Smith and he simply told him that he was working in the shingle mill. It is said that the Oklahoma authorities got their clue from a man who worked in the mill with Roberts and whom Roberts thought did not recognize him.

Family Destitute - Constable Cox has served notice of ejectment on Wm. McHale and family, who live at Thirteenth and Commercial, Hugh Sneddon wanting them out of his place because they don't pay their rent. Mr. Cox says that the family is destitute, the mother having been sick a long time and the oldest son having been ill. There are six children. McHale says he has been unable to get employment, but expected to go to work in the pulp mill today noon. They have to leave his house by tomorrow and where they will go they don't know. Mr. Cox considers it a very pathetic case.
